WINNIPEG, May 12.

The date of the Hanlan race here has been changed to July 3d.

LONDON, May 12.

The News confirms the report of the appointment of Henry Campbell Bouneman, Financial Secretary of the War Office, as Secretary to the Admiralty; Leonard Courtney, under Colonial Secretary, as Joint Secretary of the Treasury; and Hon. Evelyn Ashley, Parliamentary Secretary of the Board of Trade, Under Colonial Secretary.

CAIRO, May 12.

The Notables have unanimously refused to assemble unless legally convened. When Arabi Bey heard their decision, he exclaimed: "Then we shall have civil war." A military demonstration is momentarily expected.

LONDON, May 12.

The Provincial papers publish rumors that Sir Vernon Harcourt, Home Secretary, has received letters from Fenians, threatening his life.

The man Nagle stated at Southport that the men who offered him money to assist in the murder, were canal boat men.

A man supposed to be an American was arrested at Belfast yesterday, on suspicion of being concerned in the murders in Dublin. He has been remanded for a week. His name is Forrest Walker.
