PADDY.

MAPLE SUGAR.—The Indian was the original maple sugar maker. A translation of the writings of a French writer who dates from 1724 gives the following description:—In the month of March, when the sun has gained a little power, and when the sap begins to flow in the trees, they make incisions crosswise with a hatchet on the trunks of the trees, from which there flows an abundance of sap, which they receive in large vessels of bark. They afterwards boil this sap over the fire, which evaporates some of the water, and thickens the rest to the consistency of syrup, or even of cakes of sugar, according to the amount of heat to which they subject it. There is no other mystery in the operation. This sugar is very good for the lungs and excellent for medicinal purposes. Although it is more wholesome than that of Canaan, it has not its fleshy of flavor, but almost always has a slightly burnt taste. The French make it better than the savages from whom they learned the process, but they have not yet succeeded in bleaching and refining it.

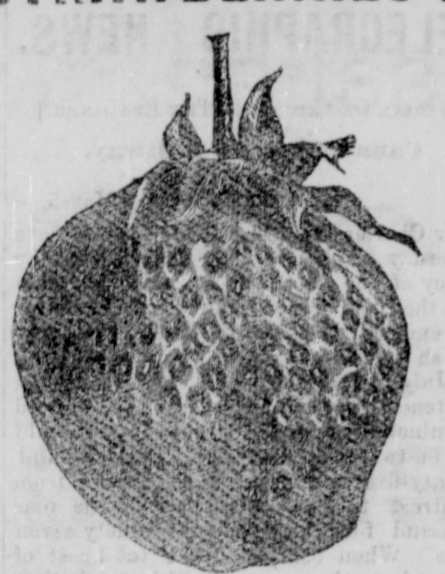
