The Religious Intelligencer says:— "A Canadian named James McLeod thus writes from Kansas to a friend: 'Hundreds of people are leaving their farms and moving out of the State on account of the drought. There has not been any rain for over a year in Kansas, and there will not be a wagon load of wheat raised this season. I was offered a 160 acre farm for \$50 yesterday, but it would be dear at any price.'

Mr. E. M. Lasseville, a French Canadian in the United States, who has been enquiring into the condition of his fellow countrymen across the line, writes to the Montreal Witness: "I visited Plattsburg on my way to Elm's Falls (N. Y. State), and inquired how the Canadians were doing, and if they had any chance there. They all said: No business is dull and wages low. "I next visited Crown Point, N. Y. A large iron business is done here, it being near to extensive iron mines, in which a few Canadians work very hard for comparatively small wages. Those employed in the foundries are equally poorly paid. I saw some workmen in both branches who were equally disgusted with their work and with their wages."
