

THE MARKETS.

Pork—Montreal advices state that in previous a good steady trade is reported and the tone of the market is firm. We quote: Canadian pork, \$15 to \$16 per barrel, per Canadian lard in pails, at 7 to 7 1/2, and compound refined at 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 per pound; hams, 12c to 14c, and bacon 12c to 13c per pound. In Chicago pork advances 7 1/2c to 12 1/2c. Doing \$8 47 1/2 September, \$8 50 October \$8 52 1/2 December, \$9 92 1/2 January. Lard was firm, closing \$4 70 September and October, \$4 77 1/2 December, \$4 90 January. Short ribs closed \$5 47 1/2 September and October, \$4 97 1/2 January.

Cheese—The cheese market is without any important change. The demand for western goods was slow, and business, on the whole, was quiet at steady prices.

TROTTING AT THE PARK.

The Track Record Broken.

The fifth heat of the 2.35 class and the fourth heat of the free-for-all, were trotted after THE EXAMINER was sent to press last evening, and as they did not decide either event these two races could not be finished until this morning.

2.35 CLASS.

Fifth Heat—Lady Rampart took the lead just after getting the word, and finished neck and neck with Bye and Bye. The judges declared it a dead heat as far as first place was concerned, and gave third place to Bell Nut, fourth to Shaver, fifth to Lilly E., sixth to Bean Prince, seventh to Baton, eighth to He did, ninth to Hata-u, and tenth to Flashlight. Flashlight was distanced. Time 2.29 1/2.

Sixth Heat—Lady Rampart took the lead at the start, followed by Bye and Bye, with Shaver a good third. Shaver however, soon obtained second place, and at the half were almost neck and neck. After passing the half, Shaver took first place, and finished first with Bye and Bye second and Lady Rampart third. Time 2.26.

After the sixth heat of the 2.35 class, Miss Bertie Brown, daughter of Mr. P. S. Brown, of the Revere Hotel, gave an exhibition of running on her favorite mare Topsy. Miss Brown proved herself to be a dexterous horsewoman, and made the half in 1.09.

At the half Shaver was leading with Lady Rampart second and Bye and Bye third. Coming up to the three quarters Bye and Bye passed Lady Rampart and sailed for the leader. By the time the last turn was reached Bye and Bye was well up with Shaver and on the home stretch she took first place which she held to the finish. Shaver was about two lengths behind with Lady Rampart third. Time 2.25 1/2.

First money goes to Bye and Bye, second to Shaver and third to Lady Rampart.

THIS AFTERNOON'S RACES.

First Heat—They got a fairly good send-off after considerable scoring. Pandict Jr., took the lead at the first turn and held it throughout winning by about three lengths, Lady Rampart finished second, with Shaver a good third. Minnie finished fourth and Longfellow fifth. Brown Bird was distanced. Time 2.29 1/2.

Second Heat—Lady Rampart took the lead and kept that place to the quarter where Minnie took that position and held it to the finish leading the field at the finish by several lengths. Pandict Jr., dropped into second place after passing the half, and held it to the close of the heat. Shaver finished third and Lady Rampart fourth. Longfellow was distanced. Time 2.26 1/2.
