U.S. SENTIMENTAL CHOICE Canada's Favored In World Championships

By CARL FELTHER, COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (CP)—Canada was rated the logical favorite but the United States was the sentimental choice as the big clubs in the 14-country world hockey championships concluded their 12-day competition Wednesday.

Any doubts that the 1962 competition would be officially recognized as a world tournament were removed when Robert Ledo of Chamblay, Ontario, president of the International Hockey Federation, invoked a rule to kick a Russian attempt to strip it of the championship label.

The Soviet Union and three other Communist countries withdrew from the tournament when the Allied Travel Bureau in West Berlin refused to grant travel permits to the East German team.

As Plenty Drama; P.E.I. Has Heartbreaker

Canadian Press Sports Editor KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—A doubleheader at Saskatoon British Columbia and Saskatchewan scored triples on the final end Wednesday night to register another unbelievable victory in the drama-packed sixth round of the Canadian curling championship. Each took advantage of misses by opposing skips in the final end.

British Columbia barely got past winless Prince Edward Island in the 11-10 tie-up. The non-losing record in the 11-province round-robin championship took 10-8 for its fourth victory. Saskatchewan won a 7-5 thriller over Ontario.

And while these games were going on the defending champion, Alberta, took a walk against Newfoundland scored on only four ends to defeat a battling Newfoundland rink 10-8 for its fourth victory in five games against one loss.

Saskatchewan, Ontario and Newfoundland follow with four victories and two defeats each. Ontario had to fight all the way to beat Quebec 11-8 and New Brunswick, clobbered 13-3 by Prince Edward Island.
