

**Of Special Interest to our Farmers**

**PROF. ROBERTSON'S PRIZES.**  
For Biggest Ears of Grain.

Sir,—Like produce like. Can my own enthusiasm—tempered but not turned by age—can it produce a like quickening power in the farm boys and girls of Canada? I think it will. Many of us have had them "up before the Lord," in the most sacred sense of those words for years; and now the time has come to act in new ways. This is only one of the little first steps in one direction in a great movement. Since the publication of my statements on the importance of selecting as foundation stock for seed grain, only heads which carry a large number of seeds each, I learn that many farmers and their sons and daughters have gathered large heads from the growing crops. Others have arranged to pick large heads from the sheaves in the barn. I desire to obtain a small quantity of seed from different localities; and also to learn how great number of seeds per head of oats and wheat have been secured in different parts of Canada. To gain the co-operation of the boys and girls and also teachers, I offer the following prizes for open competition.

For the 100 heads bearing the largest number of seeds.

The whole of each lot of 100 heads should be picked from one variety grown in one field; and only from a crop which has given a large yield per acre. I shall want every competitor to furnish from the same crop 10 (ten) heads with the smallest number of seeds per head which he or she can find, but the number of seeds in the small heads will not be considered in making the awards. I hope boys and girls will not trouble to write for any further information; but select the 100 largest heads of grain; and save them carefully with the grain on.

Full particulars, regarding the report to accompany the heads, and some other matters, will be given in an early issue of this paper. I shall watch with keen interest the part the boys and girls and teachers take in this movement for the improvement of the crops of the country.

sells grain produced upon this farm year after year will soon exhaust his farm, while the farmer who feeds the productions of his farm will not only maintain but may improve the fertility of his soil. Farmers as a rule do not give sufficient thought to the food question, as to the best method of feeding for securing the largest amount of gain from the feed. It is not always a question of what will produce the greatest amount of pork from the food grown on my farm, being those for which it is best adopted. The chief expense in growing hogs is the feed. Therefore it is a matter that is entitled to the greatest study of the farmer. It is apparent to everyone that the more gain that can be got out of pastures the cheaper is the production of pork, and experience will teach that some grain with the pasture is more profitable than an exclusive grass feed. There are a great many root feeds and vegetables that have but little feeding qualities, except that they enable the animal to get more out of his grain. The hog that doesn't eat doesn't grow and doesn't gain and is no profit to the owner, therefore it is necessary to see that the hog is kept in a condition that will give him a natural and strong appetite, to insure the best growth and profit. It is not a good plan to over-feed. It is also important that feeding should be done regularly at stated times. There is nothing that will throw an animal out of feed and out of condition and in an unprofitable state so quick as constipation, and this should be provided against. It is the forerunner of various diseases and complications.
