

Stafford Smythe Sees Pittsburgh Next NHL City

NEW YORK (AP)—Stafford Smythe, president of Toronto Maple Leafs, figured Pittsburgh as the No. 1 city in the event of National Hockey League expansion, which he claims is "as near as a national television contract in the United States."
"Everybody talks about Los Angeles and San Francisco when it comes to expansion but they're last in line in my opinion," said the young executive in a telephone interview Wednesday. Smythe is also a member of the NHL's Board of Governors, the circuit's policy-making group.

Baltimore, St. Louis and Cleveland also rate ahead of the West Coast cities," Smythe continued. "The Minneapolis-St. Paul area is another good one, although they don't have a large enough arena at the present time."
Pittsburgh drew Los Angeles as two to one last season. Baltimore is outdrawing L.A. this year. The West Coast teams make a big thing about large attendance figures, but they never see any money figures published. I think they're a long way off from going big league. I've been on the West Coast and haven't been impressed with the hockey operations there."

DETROIT (AP)—The Syracuse team in the Eastern Professional Hockey League was moved there, Minneapolis and St. Paul are in the amateur international league. The Pittsburgh area has a seating capacity of 10,700, Cleveland 10,000 and St. Louis around 14,000. The Los Angeles Blades can seat about 14,000 for its Western League games.
Detroit has the smallest seating capacity of the six NHL arenas at 12,500.
"I have talked to television executives of all the major networks in the United States," Smythe revealed. "They are reluctant to go for a contract until the league is more widespread. They must that sponsors feel that Los Angeles is the No. 2 market, next to New York."
