Western Farm Journal Pays High Tribute To PEI Pigs

"How good are Prince Edward Island pigs?" is the question asked and answered in a highly complimentary article appearing in the current issue of "The Country Guide," a leading farm journal published in Winnipeg. The author, Mr. F. M. Baker, is the Western representative of the Industrial and Development Council of Canada Meat Packers, and he goes fully into the achievement of Island hog breeders since 1922.

"At that time, Mr. Harold W. Clay, senior livestock fieldman for the Province, commenced work as a grader at the Charlottetown plant. The writer pays warm tribute to Mr. Clay's work in developing the quality of Island hogs during the succeeding years. This achievement is highlighted by the statement that out of the Canadian total of 642 sows and 57 boars qualifying in Advanced Registry in the two year period June 1948, through May, 1950, the Island had 281 sows and 31 boars.

"The Provincial Boar Bonus Policy, under which all Class A boars standing for public service are bonused by a cash grant of \$12 per year, with \$8 for Class B boars, and under which policy it is necessary for all boars to be inspected at least once a year, has been another very important link in improvement. This inspection has been turned over by the provincial department to Clay and his Dominion men. They used their trips to inspect and discuss the whole herd with the owner; to recommend celeration and removal of certain sows and boars; and to give generally the whole conduct of pig operations on a farm.

"So well has such advice been given and received that Clay and his men stand in the unique position of being at the same time inspectors for, guides to, counsellors and friends of, all breeders. They also are the practical salesman for the breeders. No pig is sold for export from the Island without Clay being consulted. Without fear or favor, he does not hesitate to cull those which do not come up to his standards and, in the main, he fixes the price at which the accepted pigs go to new buyers. In fact, Prince Edward Island has one of the largest centrally supervised breeding units as far as pigs are concerned, and so far, the results have been of the best.

Western Reaction - "The first Island pigs to come West were ordered by mail by one of the first breeders. In 1946, a carload of breeding stock was split between Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Northern Alberta. In 1947, another carload established a number of Advanced Registry Breeding Clubs west of Saskatoon, under the direction of C. A. Cooke of the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture. In 1948, the additions within those clubs were used to start additional clubs in the northwest section of the province. In 1949, also, a carload of stock was divided between Saskatchewan and Northern Alberta, and still another went to Southern Saskatchewan and Central Alberta.

"In 1949, the swine breeders' section of the Prince Albert (Sask.) Agricultural Society paid \$500 for old Woodstock Duke 14A (the boar which had made an outstanding breeding record on the Island), 18 breed sows and gilts for members of the section, and an extra ten gilts, which were brought along at the same time to help defray expenses. Later sold at auction, these gilts averaged \$187 each and cleared enough over their cost to pay for the boar, all expenses of shipment, and leave some money with the section.

Retail Sales Up 9 Per Cent In Sept.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13 - (CP) - Sales in Canadian retail stores showed a "marked" gain of nine per cent in September over the corresponding month of last year, the Bureau of Statistics said today. Increases were registered by 18 of the 20 trades reporting and in all provinces except Saskatchewan. For the first nine months of the year, the over-all advance was 6.2 per cent. Appliances and radio stores and motor vehicle dealers reported increases of 27 and 25 per cent, respectively. British Columbia had the largest sales gain with a rise of 12.8 per cent, followed by Ontario with a rise of 12 per cent. Sales in Quebec rose 9.6 per cent, Alberta six per cent, the Maritimes 5.8 per cent, and Manitoba 4.8 per cent. In Saskatchewan, sales were down 3.1 per cent.

Observes 50th Anniversary As Stamp Vendor

Yesterday marked fifty years' continuous service to the public for Mr. Aubrey F. Brown. Mr. Brown is a familiar figure to visitors to the Charlottetown Post Office as he sits at his desk inside the postage stamp wicket and dispenses stamps of all denominations. Many of his customers have commented on his courteousness and kindness and Mr. Brown will no doubt be the recipient of many good wishes as he goes quietly about his business of stamp vending today. Stamps have changed greatly since he first went into the Post Office to take up his duties on November 13, 1900, and Mr. Brown has many memories of ever-changing times and customers. He is now in his 79th year, and still works from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. until quite recently he worked until 8 o'clock at night. For the past seven years he has been assisted by Mrs. W. MacLachlan. Although Mr. Brown has been in the same work in the same building during his half a century as stamp vendor, his tiny wicket has been moved no less than six times. The present situation on the left of the door is far superior to any previous one, he says. No records are available for stamp sales during the earlier part of his service, but in January 1930 they totalled 4,771 dollars worth for the month. In January this year Mr. Brown's sales were \$10,300 for the month.

Yesterday marked fifty years' continuous service to the public for Mr. Aubrey F. Brown. Mr. Brown is a familiar figure to visitors to the Charlottetown Post Office as he sits at his desk inside the postage stamp wicket and dispenses stamps of all denominations. Many of his customers have commented on his courteousness and kindness and Mr. Brown will no doubt be the recipient of many good wishes as he goes quietly about his business of stamp vending today. Stamps have changed greatly since he first went into the Post Office to take up his duties on November 13, 1900, and Mr. Brown has many memories of ever-changing times and customers. He is now in his 79th year, and still works from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. until quite recently he worked until 8 o'clock at night. For the past seven years he has been assisted by Mrs. W. MacLachlan.
