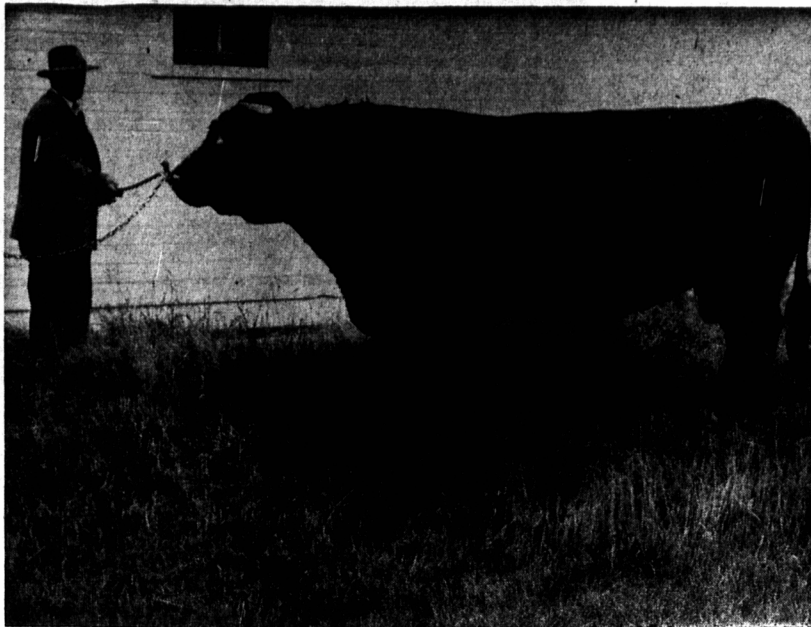

100-Year-Old Front Page Reprinted

MONTREAL (CP) — The Herald, founded in 1811, Wednesday carried a reprint of the front page of an extra edition issued Sept. 28, 1855.

The big news of that day was the fall of Sebastopol, marking the final victory for the British and the French in the Crimean War.

Alongside the news from the front was printed a proclamation by Mayor Wolfred Nelson of Montreal calling on "all good and loyal citizens to manifest their joy at the glorious news of the fall of Sebastopol by illuminating their windows tonight."

Schurman's School Parade Opens Its Seventh Season

Six Years ago the M. F. Schurman Company Limited, embarked on a program for children of school age known as "Schurman's School Parade". The program through this period of time has met with outstanding success and in the homes of many is heard the program which families enjoy together each Friday evening over radio station C. J. R. W. from 7.30 to 8.30.

Since this program was inaugurated thousands of school children have entered through its portals either with their selections in reading, public speaking, vocal solos, piano solos, or as groups in group singing, interscholastic spelling and quiz competitions. It has been a program which has been full of good fun and fellowship among the contestants, teachers and the radio audience.

The 1955-56 season of Schurman's School Parade will follow the same general pattern as was used during the 1954-55 season. The first half hour of the program will consist of the individual competition of the school children while the second half hour will be taken up with an interscholastic quiz contest up until the end of December and then in the spring with the well known and enjoyed interscholastic spelling competition.

The awards again this year will consist of beautifully styled silver and bronze awards for individual competition and in group competition distinctively designed silver and french bronze shields are awarded to the winning schools on which the names of the contestants are inscribed.

It is hoped by the M.F. Schurman Company that all the teachers who are in a position to provide transportation to Summerside will give their students the opportunity to appear on this human interest and educational program.

It is further suggested that entry forms be forwarded to the M. F. Schurman Company at an early date.

Because of the number of entries on hand at the end of April it was impossible to receive any further entries which were already much more than sufficient to carry the program until its closing date in the middle of June.

The competition will again be broken up into two divisions—one being the 1-3 classroom division schools and the other the four and over classroom division schools. Duplicate awards will be made to both divisions and judging will also be done separately.

Mr. Charles Linkletter of the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. will again be master of ceremonies and he will be ably assisted by Mr. Clarence Mercer, Superintendent of the Summerside High School and also Mr. Wendell Nuttall of the M.F. Schurman Co., Ltd. who will act as judge and scorekeeper on the inter-school team competitions.

Schurman's School parade is sponsored and produced by the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., of Kensington, Summerside and Charlottetown as a public service feature and is presented with the earnest and sincere desire to give the Island school children an opportunity to express themselves openly before a radio audience.

Egmont Bay was four cross bred Cheviots by Oxford which was quite an even lot although they could have carried more finish. The second and third placings went to two Cheviot groups and in this class there were also a few good groups of a pen of two market lambs. From this class Mr. Samson said came the best market lamb of the show. He said that the breeding classes were

all well filled in both the Oxford and Cheviot breeds, the Oxfords taking the male and female championship. In the Oxford class the top placings in the female class were taken by exhibits showing the blockiness of the Shropshire breed and he said there were some very good entries which had to be put down due to bad udders.

Mr. Samson said that the Cheviot seemed to increase in popularity both as pure breeds and for crossing with the Oxfords. He suggested that flocks should be increased as the larger units are the profitable ones to the commercial sheep man.
