PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MILK CONTROL BOARD APPROVAL OF PRESCRIPTION OF PRICE STANDARDS IN BORDEN, HUNTER RIVER AND NORTH BUSTICO Pursuant to section 8 of "The Prince Edward Island Milk and Cream Producers, Consumers and Distributors Protective Act", Council did and doth hereby approve Order No. 38 of the Prince Edward Island Milk Control Board made by the said Board on the 18th day of July, 1951:— ORDER NO. 38 Notice is hereby given that on and after the 1st day of August, 1951, the price of pasteurised milk in the town of Borden shall be at the rate of 16c per quart and 8c per pint. The price of fluid milk to the producer in the area of Borden shall be at the rate of \$1.04 per pound butter-fat. Notice is also hereby given that on and after August 1st, 1951, the price of raw milk in the Hunter River and North Bustico markets shall be at the rate of 15c per quart and 8c per pint.
