

Rocketeers Of Former Reich Are On Both Sides Of Curtain

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala. (AP) — In the town of Peenemunde, Germany, on the Baltic Sea, German scientists built the V-2 rockets which bombarded London. In the last tormented days of Hitler's Third Reich they were working on an anti-aircraft missile to destroy the closely packed formations of Allied bombers which were shattering German war plants and morale.

Russians and the Western Allies were sweeping through the country in 1945 and the scientists had a choice. They could stay at Peenemunde and be captured by the Russians. Or they could head West.

WENT TO U.S. — Of the group, 130 came west. And today, inside one of the great laboratory-machine shops here, lies the great Jupiter-C, the latest lineal descendant of the German V-2.

Dr. Werner von Braun was technical director at Peenemunde — and has the same job at Redstone.

Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger, atomic physicist, Dr. Martin Schillies, the brilliant propellant expert, and Wilhelm Angele, who developed the V-2, are among the scientists here.

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It's a fantastic place, where scientists talk seriously of going to the moon or Mars within the next 30 or 40 years.

...there is no other team which has carried the idea forward from its earliest concepts to the present. It is not that we are genius, it is just that we have been working on it so long.

"We have already made more mistakes than the other people have. Sometimes it is a bit frustrating to see mistakes made that we made years ago made all over again."

RCAF Senior Appointments Announced

OTTAWA (CP) — New appointments effective this month for four senior officers were announced Friday by RCAF headquarters.

Affected are Group Captains Robert S. Turnbull, DFC, 38, of Govan, Sask.; Richard M. Cox, DFC, 41, of Fort Garry, Man.; Gordon G. Diamond, 42, of Vancouver and Ottawa; and Henry G. M. Colpitts, 46, of Sussex, N.B.

Group Capt. Turnbull, senior air staff officer at the RCAF's No. 1 Air Division headquarters at Metz, France, will succeed Cox as director of air defence operations at headquarters in Ottawa.

Group Capt. Cox will take command of RCAF station Trenton, Ont., from Diamond who has been assigned to the 4th Allied Tactical Air Force, Trier, Germany.

Group Capt. Colpitts, now serving with the 4th ATAF, will assume command of RCAF station St. Johns, Que., replacing Group Capt. Archambault of St. Johns, whose appointment as commandant of College Militaire Royal de St. Jean, St. Johns, was announced earlier.

Rain Changes Program At Western Eucharistic Congress

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask. (CP) — The threat of rain Sunday forced a change in the program of the three-day eucharistic congress here after a heavy downfall had washed out a planned mile-long candle light procession Saturday night.

Because of Saturday's rain, addresses by James Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto, and Paul - Emile Cardinal Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, were delivered in the armory at the exhibition grounds.

Sunday's pontifical high mass in the oriental rite conducted by Most Rev. Andrew Robereck, Ukrainian Exarch of Saskatchewan, was also held in the armory. The sermon was preached by Most Rev. Maxime Hermankuk, Ukrainian Metropolitan of Canada.

Cardinal McGuigan and Cardinal Leger, along with other church dignitaries, arrived Saturday by motorcade from Saskatoon.

At a reception for the cardinals in Prince Albert, a message from Pope Pius XII extended apostolic blessings, and a telegram from Prime Minister John Diefenbaker was read.

Throughout Saturday religious worshippers and clerical dignitaries of the Roman Catholic church gathered for the first eucharistic congress on the Prairies. At the "eucharistic city" at the fair grounds where a gigantic repository has been constructed.

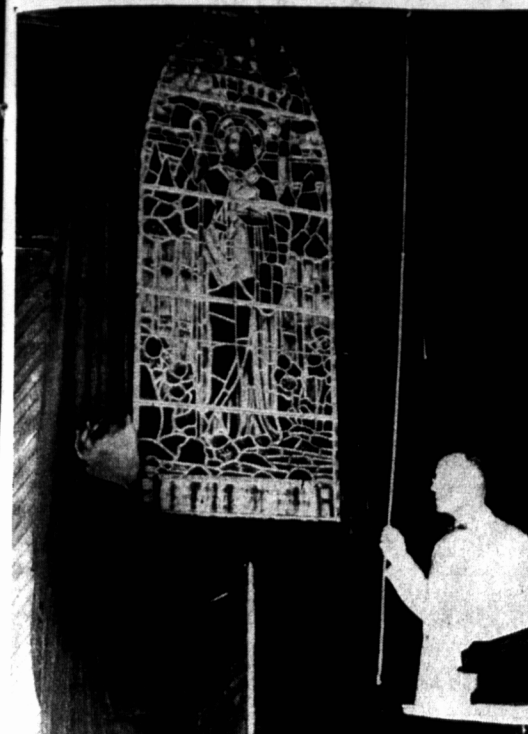
SPIRITUAL PURPOSE — Cardinal McGuigan said the main purpose of the congress was spiritual.

In stressing the importance of spiritual values, Cardinal McGuigan said: "We live in a democratic country. Remember there is no true democracy without a belief in a sovereign Lord, without a belief in the individual soul of man, from which beliefs we come to have greatest regard for the dignity of the human person."

Cardinal Leger remarked that "it is the aim of these three days of prayer to sanctify ourselves because there is a challenge facing us.

There are many persons and nations who do not believe in God. This simple fact presents us with our work."

The congress, a special religious pageant during which the church invites the faithful to render homage to Christ, the eucharistic king, is being held in connection with the 75th anniversary of Sacred Heart parish and the 50th anniversary of Prince Albert diocese. A tribute to a pioneer family of St. Peter's was given fitting prominence in a solemn service of dedication when a beautiful memorial stained glass window was presented to the United Church of St. Peter's by Mr. and Mrs. Robert MacEwen of Rosedale, Mass. in memory of their parents, the late Adolphus MacEwen and Jessie MacEwen.

Rev. A. Frank MacLean, Pastor of Trinity Church, Charlottetown presided at the dedication of the window which is entitled, "I am the Good Shepherd." It depicts in beautiful colours Our Lord holding a lamb in His arms with the shepherd's crook in His right hand. Trinity Male Eight under the direction of Royston F. Muford, A.R.C.O. rendered several delightful numbers and added greatly to the service of worship.

SHEPHERD'S CONCERN — Rev. Mr. MacLean in centering his sermon around the 23rd Psalm showed how the psalmist drew a clear picture of a shepherd's regard for his flock. The Minister stated that a sheep rarely lifts its head while grazing and is thus directed by its own appetite. It was then that the shepherd's voice brought the wayward sheep back to the fold.

Mr. MacLean reminded the congregation that people like sheep are directed by their appetites and wander from the right path but the Good Shepherd is ever seeking and calling them to His fold. The preacher said the 23rd Psalm has been, and still is, a great source of comfort to many people.

The church was filled to capacity for the service.

FEAR BREAK-UP

On the surface here and in Huntsville everything is going smoothly. But there is a certain uneasiness among the scientists and the people in Huntsville who maintain a close liaison with the arsenal.

There are fears that this group, known mostly as "the team," may be broken up.

Last fall before Defence Secretary Charles E. Wilson decreed that the army should be limited to the development of a 200-mile missile and that the air force should be given the task of developing both the intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM) and the intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM).

The IRBM would have a range of 1,500 miles. The ICBM should be able to span oceans and continents.

NAVY GOT IT — Some 22 months earlier, Wilson had assigned to the navy development of a rocket to launch an earth satellite. This is the highly-publicized Vanguard project.

The air force's IRBM is known as the Thor. It also has an ICBM called the Atlas.

So far as is known, none of these missiles—Thor, Vanguard or Atlas—has ever been fired successfully.

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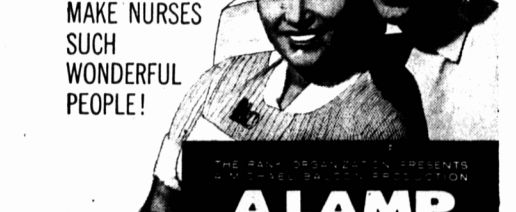
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
