FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Hopkins, arrived from Halifax yesterday afternoon with a cargo of general merchandise and one passenger—R. E. Harris. She sailed for Summerside at 10 o'clock last night and left there this forenoon for Port Huron.

The City of Ghent left Halifax last night and will be due here on Saturday.

C. M. B. A.—The Supreme Council of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association met in Montreal on the 12th. There was a large attendance of delegates. The treasurer's report shows that the sum of \$1,253,070 was received during the past two years, and the supreme recorder states that the membership is 34,794. New branches to the number of 148 were established, forty-one being in Canada.

PROLEGNE.—The next great fistic event is the battle between Joe Choynski, of California, and George Godfrey, of Boston. They will fight before the Conroy Island Athletic Club, on Monday evening, Oct. 31, for a purse of \$5,000, of which the victor receives \$4,500 and the loser \$500. Both men are now in training. Choynski at the Navesink Highlands and Godfrey at Revere Beach, Boston.

AN OLD FRIEND HEARD FROM.—A Brockville, Ont., despatch of the 10th says: A lady named Shepperd hired the town hall to deliver a lecture against Roman Catholicism to-night, but the property committee, when it learned the nature of the subject, withdrew the permission. To-night a crowd, numbering thousands, assembled and demanded admission for the lady, but this was refused, and the mayor was requested to give permission to batter in the doors, but this he denied having the power to do. The Orangemen are getting up an impromptu demonstration to express their indignation over the affair.

BROKE JAIL.—Three prisoners escaped from the Bangor, Me., jail on Sunday morning last. Their names are Charles M. Tweedie, John Ryan and John McDonald. Tweedie hails from Houlton, Me., Ryan from Fredericton, N. B., and McDonald from Prince Edward Island. McDonald was working out a sentence of eighteen months for assaulting a colored deaf mute. He is described as being 23 years old, height 6 feet, dark complexion, black moustache just cropping out, weight about 190 pounds.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 13. Sir John Thompson has been appointed President of the Council, during the President's absence.

Judge Wartels, of the Supreme Court of Quebec, has been promoted to the Queen's Bench, vice Judge Cross, resigned.

Chief Justice Sir Alexander Lacoste, ex-Speaker of the Senate, has been sworn in as a Privy Councillor.

Censures a Prince. LONDON, Oct. 13.

The Star makes a covert attack on the Prince of Wales' absence from Tennyson's funeral service. The Star prints a letter saying the Prince prefers to go shooting or attending Newmarket race to attending the funeral of such a man as Tennyson.

The writer protests that the Prince finds hopping over helpless birds more congenial employment than attending the funeral of a great man, and urges that his dereliction on this occasion be not allowed to pass without official protest.

Sports at Halifax. HALIFAX, Oct. 13.

The Dalhousie won from the Leicestershire Regiment yesterday at football—a try to nothing.

In the races at the Riding grounds yesterday, the 3 minute race was won by Gentleman, with Black Tom second; the 2.40 was taken by Gladstone, with C. P. R. second. The match race between the stallions Resolution and Stranger was won by the former in straight heats.

Tennyson and Canada. LONDON, Oct. 13.

Sir Charles Tupper's presence at Tennyson's funeral on behalf of Canada recalls Tennyson's pleasure at the rendering by Albany, the Canadian artist, of his jubilee ode at the opening of the Colonial Exhibition. Tennyson always took a keen interest in Canadian progress and resented the spirit of "Little Englandism," which was willing to abandon her to the United States.

Railway News. MONCTON, Oct. 13.

The new time table of the Intercolonial Railway goes into effect on Monday next, 17th inst.

There is a rumor that Pottinger will become general manager of Government railways in place of Scribner, who, it is believed, will still be connected with the department at Ottawa.

Still They Come. MONTREAL, Oct. 13.

The stream of immigration from Washington, Nebraska and the Northern States to the Canadian Territories is quite unprecedented, and thousands of acres are being taken up every week by those people, who are delighted with their new homes.

After the Czar. PARIS, Oct. 13.

Dix Nourime Siele says an attempt has been made to assassinate the Czar by blowing up his train with a dynamite bomb, and that five persons were killed and fourteen injured by the explosion.

General Telegraphic News. WINNIPEG, Oct. 11.—There is indignation in military circles over the suspension of Col. Villiers, deputy adjutant general, on the strength of a rumor that he had left the district on his honeymoon trip. A despatch has been received suspending Col. Villiers and temporarily naming Capt. Howard as head of the local militia.

The colonel had not left his district, as all g-d, as his trip had not extended beyond Port Arthur, which is within the boundaries. General Howard is receiving a good deal of censure for having acted so hastily on a despatch sent by a busybody.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Emigration business was resumed this week as the cholera scare is thought to be over, the Allan and Dominion lines booking British and Scandinavians to Canadian points only. Though the season has almost ended, emigration workers here are asking whether the Dominion government intends to adopt a definite immigration policy. It is regretted by them that the change of the service from the agriculture to the interior department has borne such small fruits. The belief is general that a careful revision of the plans by the specially charged minister in concert with the workers here is needed. It is thought here that a special attempt is wanted to secure a prepaid passage system, such as peopled the Western States. Both New Zealand and Queensland are making special efforts, in view of the farm laborer strike, to supply the labor market through the medium of assisted passages.

LARCENY.—At Cardigan, yesterday, before W. P. Lewis and Donald Stewart, E. G. J. P.'s, Allen McSwain was arraigned on a charge of receiving stolen goods. It appears that on the night of Wednesday, the 5th inst., a lot of harness, carpenter's tools, and other articles were stolen from the premises of George E. Goff, Woodville, Lot 54. Owing to the heavy rain during that day and evening, the carriage used by the thieves could be tracked considerable distance, and suspicion was excited against Neil and Hugh McSwain. A search warrant was sworn out by Mr. Goff before W. P. Lewis, and placed in the hands of Constable McGregor. Yesterday, the warrant was executed, the stolen goods being found on McSwain's premises and Allen McSwain was arrested. Neil and Hugh McSwain could not be found. Allen McSwain, after the preliminary hearing, was remanded to jail at Georgetown.
