The mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax arrived in Charlottetown last evening on its fourth visit to the province during this Red Cross centennial year, and will commence the first of this week's series at St. Dunstan's University gymnasium this afternoon.

Chairman for the Red Cross blood donor committee for the St. Dunstan's Students' Council this year is Vincent Cannon who, along with representatives of other various classes, has been busily engaged in promoting a record attendance at today's clinic which has an objective of at least 25 donors in the three-hour period between one and four. The students at St. Dunstan's have established an enviable reputation for themselves over the past few years for their response to this life-saving project. The chairman is confident that this record will be well maintained as the result of two "Tonight at 8 o'clock the three days' series in Charlottetown will set underway at the beautifully appointed and spacious new Knights of Columbus Centre on Richmond Street which has been generously loaned to the Red Cross blood donor committee for this week's clinics.
