The Government steamer La Canadienne, from the Magdalen Islands, ran into Souris Thursday morning to land Col. Hunter Duvau, one of the Fishery Commission, who wants a few days on the Island to attend to his duties as Inspector; also Commissioner Deacon, of Westmorland County, New Brunswick, who returns home for a similar purpose. We believe the Commission reassemble at Port Mulgrave shortly to enquire along the Cape Breton and Nova Scotia coasts.

REAR-ADMIRAL VIGNES, of the French warship Minerve, which recently visited this port, Lieut. Ducrest Villeneuve, Consul-General Dubai, Hon. Justice Wurtelle. Mr. H. Jonas and W. O'Brien left Montreal on Saturday last for British Columbia, via the Canadian Pacific Railway. The party has secured a special car. They will probably rest at Winnipeg, Banff and other centres en route, and will remain away about three weeks. Admiral Vignes will have an opportunity of studying the country and reporting on its greatness and prosperity when he returns to his friends in France.

Not a hundred miles from Dorchester, N. B., on Friday last, says a despatch to the Moncton Transcript, there was in real life enacted an exciting chapter of a novel. An elderly gentleman came in the early morning train from a St. John River county to marry a lady whom he had never seen. He came to the house of his fiancée, saw her, and after breakfast and a brief interview, he quietly slipped from the house and disappeared, not waiting for the wedding ceremony in the evening. The lady's family are very respectable people, and the conduct of the would-be groom is much condemned. Moral: never speculate in matters matrimonial—on sight and unseen.

The wife of Dr. D. M. McIntosh died in this city at 11 o'clock on Monday evening last of typho-malaria, after an illness of but a few days. The deceased was a native of Prince Edward Island. She came here about a year and a half since from Glendive, Montana, and made many friends during her residence in this city. She leaves a husband and four small children, one an infant but three weeks old. The deceased was an active member of the Presbyterian Ladies' Society. The funeral took place to-day (Wednesday) at 10 o'clock, the services being conducted by Rev. J. R. Thompson. The bereaved husband and little ones have the deepest sympathy of the community in their great loss.—Clarke County, W. T. Register. The deceased was a daughter of the late W. W. Acorn, Pownal, and a sister of the wife of Mr. J. N. Robertson, of the Post Office Department.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Stanley's Reported Assassination.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Neither the Foreign Office nor the Enim-Bey committee received any news regarding the alleged assassination of Henry M. Stanley. Officials at the Foreign Office are surprised at the intelligence in the despatch received by the French Government, and say if the news of Stanley's death had been received at Zanzibar, the British agent there had failed to send it. Sir Francis Deurten, President of the Enim-Bey relief committee, says trustworthy news of the Stanley expedition could not possibly have reached Zanzibar so soon after arrival of the expedition at Anumini on June 10.

Perkins in Parliament.

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—A special cablegram from London says Hon. W. H. Smith, in reply to Mr. Gourley in the British Commons last night, said the Imperial Government were awaiting official reports of the seizure of the American vessel Perkins. Meanwhile he declined an opinion upon the Canadian officials. The Government were now, he said, in communication with the British Minister at Washington, regarding the Behring Sea Seizures. Mr. Smith added that he was not aware that the Washington Government had instructed the American squadron to leave Canadian waters.

British Politics.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Lord Rosebery, speaking at Manchester, said the result of the recent bye-elections showed that the hour of triumph was fast approaching. Liberals had but one leader and one principle. The concessions made by Gladstone were sufficient to warrant the Liberal-Unionists re-entering the Liberal party, the doors of which were wide open. Gladstone writes to the editor of the Baptist: "I have done my best to reunite the Liberals, and except inside the House of Commons, am quite satisfied with the result."

The Eastern Difficulty.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 17.—The Journal de St. Peterburg says the Russian embassy at Constantinople has handed the Porte a protest against Prince Ferdinand's occupancy of the Bulgarian throne. It declares him guilty of an audacious attempt against the rights of Powers, and declaring that the responsibility rests entirely with him. The Journal makes this pertinent inquiry: "Can it be supposed that Russia will consider herself alone bound to become the defender of what remains of the Berlin Treaty?"

Notes from Souris.

Several very handsome private residences are now in course of construction here. First there is Mr. Uriah Matthew's, of the firm of Matthew, McLean & Co. Situated on a very convenient lot, and commanding a full view of the Bay, this house, when completed, will be one of the finest in town. It is a two storey building, with bay windows, and wing with double look-out. Mr. C. S. Sterns is also building a handsome two storey dwelling with bay windows, front and end, and all the modern improvements. Mr. James Paquet is just completing a very neat cottage. A few tenement houses are also being erected. The railway station has lately received a coat of canary colored paint, which makes it look quite aesthetic. There are a large number of men at present engaged in repairing the Breakwater. Business is flourishing. Business men are in good cheer and prospering. The Sea View House is still the favorite resort. Every one speaks in the highest terms of the way in which this popular House is conducted by its genial proprietor. Several American seiners are still here waiting for more favorable weather for fishing. The shermen are getting a few, but mackerel are very shy of the hook and still more so of the seine. The thunder storm on Tuesday evening was the most violent of the season. It was accompanied by hail and rain, which did considerable damage to crops and windows in some localities in the eastern part of the Island. The storm came up from the southwest, passing over Souris nearly directly overhead. At West River, Lot 47, the lightning struck a barn belonging to Mr. James Robertson, and soon it set its contents, which consisted of six tons of hay, a mow and reaper, ploughs, harnesses and eighty or ninety hens and chickens, were in flames. The lightning and the flames were almost simultaneous, the fire breaking out at the two gable ends of the barn as soon as struck. Mr. Robertson had no insurance on his property, and though he is in good circumstances, the loss which he has experienced will be severely felt at this season of the year. An Islander and an American fisherman were heard the other evening talking excitedly over the fishery question. Said the latter: "If we could have fished within the three mile limit we would have had a full cargo over three weeks ago." "What's the use of you talking," said the Islander, "You haven't seen a mackerel since you came into the Bay." "Yes we did," said Yankee, "but they were all inside that infernal three-mile-limit, and I hope they may stay there till they freeze fast to the bottom. I'm bound home anyhow, fish or no fish. Jim Blaine will fix these things bye-and-bye, but at present old Sir John has got the inside track."

A bulletin of the Manitoba department of agriculture just issued says that the wheat harvest is expected to be general during second week in August if the favorable ripening weather ensues. Goppers are doing some damage, but not so much as in 1886. The indications all point to a very large return.

The Grand Southern Railway has, upon application of the bond holders, been placed in the hands of H. Lawrence Sturdee, as receiver, by order of Judge Palmer. The road has been going down steadily since the New Brunswick railway has been in good working operation. At the time of its construction it obtained a subsidy of nearly four hundred thousand dollars from the province.

The Mail's cable says the Canadian team made a draw with the Gloucestershires after two days play. The game as it stood, however, was pounds and pence in favor of Grace's eleven. The Canadians went to the wickets first and scored 140, W. G. Grace being the principal bowler against them. The Gloucestershires score was 240. In the second innings the Canadians made 283, of which Henry, Halifax, who has been batting remarkably well since the tour began, contributed 88. The Gloucestershires in the second innings made 103 for the loss of three wickets, when the game was drawn. They only had 81 more runs to make to win. This constant "drawing" is unsatisfactory, but it cannot be helped. The Canadians are booked in advance for two days matches only.
