

Yankees And White Sox Split; Phillies Win 2

The streaking Philadelphia Phillies moved within a half game of the National League lead Sunday by sweeping a pair from the front running St. Louis Cardinals while the New York Yankees rallied to gain a split with Chicago in their important American League doubleheader.

Five home runs helped the Phils dump St. Louis 6-2 and 11-4, handing Don McDaniels, the \$50,000 bonus pitcher, his first defeat in the opener. Larry Jackson, top Cardinal, was chased in the second game. The two Phil winners were Curt Simmons and Jim Hearn.

Brooklyn also closed in on the Cards by beating Milwaukee 3-2 on Gil Hodges' two-run homer in the ninth after the Braves had broken a 1-1 tie with a run in the top of the ninth. The defeat left the Braves one full game behind St. Louis and Brooklyn 2½ off the pace.

REDEGS END LOSINGS

Cincinnati ended its seven-game losing slump by whacking Pittsburgh twice 9-6 and 12-4. The Redlegs came from behind to take the first with six runs in the seventh inning. Ted Kluszewski hit two homers and Skuzewski Burgess one in the 19th hit barrage in the second game.

Willie Mays' two-run homer in the 12th gave the New York Giants an 8-6 victory over Chicago in a game featured by six home runs. Whitey Lockman's second of the day with a man on base tied the score in the ninth.

The Yanks lost the first to Chicago's Billy Pierce 3-1 and trailed 4-0 going to the ninth inning of the second game before they came up with six runs and a 6-4 grand slam homer came after one victory. Formation Of Maritime Amateur Baseball Ass'n

A historic step in Maritime baseball circles was taken yesterday afternoon with the formation of a Maritime Amateur Baseball Association at a special meeting held in Amherst.

The newly formed association will work in close conjunction with the governing baseball bodies of the three Provinces, P.E.I., Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Its chief work will consist in the conducting of Maritime play-offs for the various baseball classes.

One of the first steps the association took yesterday was to divide Maritime competitions into the following brackets: Senior, Intermediate, Junior, Juvenile, and Midget. For this year at least the association will not work with any other classes.

Harold Betts of Moncton was named President of the association with Doug Harkness of Moncton as secretary. Vice Presidents from each of the three provinces are: P.E.I.-Brigadier W.W. Reid; Nova Scotia, W. J. Nolles, Springhill; New Brunswick, John P. Hodgins, Moncton.

In a best of three series the team with the choice will name its location of the first game. The second game and the third game if necessary will be played on the alternate ground. In a three game series after each team has had one home game the gate of the third game will be split by the teams following the deduction of legitimate expenses.

In a best of five series the team with the choice will name its location of the first two games which must be played on the same ground. The remainder of the series will be played on the alternate ground. In a five game series after each team has had two home games the gate of the final game will be split by the teams following the deduction of legitimate expenses. In the event that one team wins the first two games the gate of the second game will be held in trust pending the outcome of the third game. This money will be held by a representative of the Maritime body or his designate.

In regard to umpires it was decided that in all play-off games the visiting team shall provide a qualified umpire-in-chief with the home team to provide the base judges. These umpires in a cash case must be approved by the executive of the Provincial governing body.

The Association also hopes to award trophies to the various Maritime winners and they will receive offers from firms who wish to donate such trophies. In an effort to cut the baseball teams expenses the association, working with the Provincial governing bodies, will request the home team to provide accommodations for the visiting team in the Maritime play-offs.
