

Teachers Conventions At Souris And Mount Stewart

The 1955 sessions of teachers' conventions got underway yesterday with the first conventions being held at Souris and Mount Stewart.

Mr. Gerald Pineau, president, presided over the meeting at the new Souris High School attended by a large number of teachers throughout the district. Following the reading of the minutes, the following committees were appointed: resolutions, Rev. Sister S. Bridgett, Helen McIsaac, James McKinnon, Press, Catherine Mooney, Phyllis Morrison, Arthur MacNeil, Nominations, James McKinnon and Elaine McKinnon and a Finance Committee.

Pineau, in his address, welcomed the teachers, and pledged the support of the teachers to the P.E.I. Federation. He urged the teachers to give a genuine contribution to the convention, and to adopt a positive attitude. "Teachers are not just a profession," he said, "they should take a more active part in those things pertaining to their profession. It was with regret he noted so many teachers leaving the profession. 'The transiency of teachers is the cancer of our Federation and of our entire Provincial educational system,'" he said.

Mr. Pineau stressed that teachers should keep informed of new measures being proposed and effected in the educational system. Teachers should also encourage teacher recruitment by extolling the virtues of the profession by word and example.

Mr. H. J. Hynes, Supervisor, thanked the teachers for their cooperation during the past year, and promised his full support and assistance to every teacher in his inspectorate. Mr. Hynes went on to discuss the rising school attendance, and urged teachers to get well acquainted with the parents so as to get to know the pupil. He also discussed the time table and school equipment. Mr. Hynes also extended a special greeting to the new teachers.

Mr. Norman Macdonald, Summerside High School, spoke instructively on literature on grades nine and ten. Mr. Macdonald's theme on this subject was to make it a more pleasant period rather than one of work. He said that the study of literature could be fun and made interesting so that the student would not consider it as work, and thereby acquire a liking for literature which would result in them acquiring more knowledge on the subject. In his aids to achieve this aim, he cited the recitation of poetry, the acting of plays and the reading of good books.

In the afternoon Miss Estelle Bowness, general secretary of the P.E.I.T.F., reviewed the activities of the Federation during the past year.

Dr. L. W. Shaw, deputy minister and director of education, welcomed the teachers to the convention, and pledged the support and assistance of his department to the teachers. Mr. Shaw gave an enlightening address on social studies in the intermediate grades. He proposed several questions after which he divided the assembly into four groups to discuss these questions which were:

1. What do we consider to be social studies?
2. What are the intermediate grades?
3. Is the course of studies satisfactory?
4. What about our text books?
5. Are there parts of the course of studies that are not satisfactory?

Each group gave the results of its findings, and Dr. Shaw then offered suggestions on the teaching of geography and history by dem-

OTTAWA (CP) — Leaders of the three opposition parties in the Commons plan some political spadework across the country this fall.

The Progressive Conservative leader, Hon. George Drew, already has announced he will make a two-month, 15,000-mile trip across Canada, starting Sept. 16.

Subsequently, it was learned that M. J. Coldwell of the CCF and Solon Low of the Social Credit party, plan political travels of their own.

Mr. Coldwell will make a six-week trip across the country. Mr. Low will confine his activities to Ontario for about three weeks in October.

Mr. Low's proposed visit to Ontario is part of the recent and growing attempts by his party to extend its organization into eastern Canada from Alberta and British Columbia, where Social Credit governments are in power.

His office said he has booked a number of public meetings all over Ontario from Oct. 10 to the end of the month.
