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A NEW CONSECRRATION

Pray for our Queen. Pray today for our Queen. When Elizabeth II ascended the throne on her father's death, she pledged herself to a life-long service of her people, and asked them to pray that she might be enabled to meet all the obligations involved. A few days ago she asked the young people of her age to give strength for the tasks ahead. For all that this implies for her, let us pray, and especially today that she may be steadied and upheld through tomorrow's historic ceremony. In the depths of her experience may the inspired promise be fulfilled:—"Thou wilt keep her in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee, because she trusts in Thee."

The Coronation of our Queen is being made the occasion for an outburst of devotion to her personally, as well as to all that she symbolizes—a loyalty and love in which respect, admiration and affection are blended.

The people of the British Commonwealth of Nations realize anew the value of having a person as the symbol and bond of their unity and the source of authority among them. Other peoples have a flag, or a national anthem, or a slogan, but we have a person who is worthy of unstinted admiration, confidence and expectancy. Thrones have toppled over in other lands, but never were Tennyson's lines truer than now:—"She keeps her throne unshaken still."

Broad-based upon her people's will. And compassed by the inviolate sea."

The Coronation is a religious service; it is the representative of the church who places the crown on the Queen's head. The ceremony itself comes down to us from the distant past; for more than a thousand years Britain's kings and queens have been dedicated in the same way to their holy calling; but never has the spirit of the sovereign entered more deeply into its meaning than the present occupant of the throne.

It has been pointed out that the significant act is not the placing of the crown on the Queen's head; this is only the recognition of what is already a fact, for she became Queen the moment after the King passed away; the act of deep significance is the anointing, which symbolizes her endowment with

"the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord."

Then to seal her acceptance of the gift thus symbolized, she and her Royal Consort will kneel to receive the sacrament, the symbols of the broken body and shed blood of her Lord to whom she dedicates herself for the service of His people in His name. The prayers of all her subjects should join with hers as she on our behalf enters anew into this sacred covenant.

It has been the record of the British that, as they moved into each new future, they carried with them the precious treasures of their past. For example, the French and Russians in their revolutions liquidated the classes who had ruled them in their past and out themselves off from most of what those classes stood for.

The British people, toward freedom, the loyalty and the service of the classes whose arbitrary powers they took away. Once tyrants wore the crown; now the crown is the guarantee of the people's liberties. In two worlds for in the world's history, and a study of those conflicts will show that none fought more valiantly than the sons of those noble families whose authority had been gradually taken over by the people themselves.

Our flag has come down from the Age of Faith to us in this secular world, and its combination of the different forms of the cross symbolizes our devotion to all that the cross stands for in the purposes of God and in the history of our race. Similarly the crown is the symbol of our heritage from a great past and inspiration for the future. Among King David's last words are the following:—"The God of Israel has said to me: When one rules justly over men, ruling in the fear of God, He dawns on them like the morning light, like the sun shining forth upon a cloudless morning, like rain that makes grass to sprout from the earth."

Fondly we hope and fervently we pray that this inspired ideal will be realized in the reign of our gracious Sovereign who, under an act of our own Parliament, has become "Elizabeth the Second, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom, Canada, and her other realms and territories Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith."

What does the Coronation mean for Canada as we enter this second Elizabethan era? To us it will be nothing but a mere form unless we join our Queen in a new consecration to the purposes of God in
