APPOINTMENT.—We learn that Mr. Charles J. Mitchell, of Charlottetown, has been appointed messenger to the offices in the Dominion Building, in the place of James Grant, deceased. Mr. Mitchell entered upon his duties this morning.

AS IT SHOULD BE.—Evidently "Christian toleration and mutual friendliness" exist to an unlimited extent in Newfoundland. At a sacred concert in the Roman Catholic cathedral at St. John's the other night, the choirs of nearly all the Protestant churches in the city assisted the cathedral choir.

CANADIAN PRODUCE FOR ENGLAND.—The steamer Damara which sailed from Halifax on Saturday for London, had among her cargo 32 cases of eggs, 8547 barrels of apples, 1157 cases of match splints, 1725 doilies and 192 pkts. of mouldings.

MORE SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Journal says that Mr. John Layton shipped 404 sheep and lambs to St. John's Tuesday morning by the St. Lawrence, and that Mr. James Kane shipped 405 lambs to the same city on Wednesday morning, and a Mr. Dunn, of the same city, shipped six horses.

THE ABEGWETS VICTORIES.—A despatch received from Halifax to-day by Mr. Ernest Ings, states that in the match between the Abegweits and the Wanderers yesterday the former were the victors by a goal to nothing. The goal was secured on Hubert Macdonald's try.

LOST IN THE DEEP.—The annual report shows losses in the Gloucester fisheries this year of eighteen vessels, with a tonnage of 1,389 and insurance \$37,500. The number of lives lost is 89. The previous year there were fourteen vessels lost, with insurance of \$50,000, and 70 lives. Eighty five per cent. of the vessels were privateers or fishermen.

FROM JAPAN.—Rev. Benj. Chappelle, writing from Aoyama, Tokyo, under date of 29th September, says: "Cholera continues. About one hundred cases daily in Tokyo, about 160 daily in Osaka. Osaka has had five thousand deaths by it, Tokyo only about fifteen hundred. As cooler weather is now coming the trouble will disappear. Yesterday and to-day were beautiful days, like early September at home."

POLICE COURT.—This morning, Albert Roberts was fined \$50 or one month's imprisonment for a first violation of the Canada Temperance Act, and two drunks were disposed of for \$1 or 4 days and \$3 or 14 days respectively. A Scott Act case was adjourned until the 14th for further evidence, and another was dismissed. The case of the man charged with obtaining money under false pretences was further adjourned.

THANKSGIVING DAY AT THE POOR HOUSE.—Under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. the usual Thanksgiving Festival was held at the Poor House yesterday afternoon, to the great delight of the forty-two inmates, to whom this annual treat is the event of the year. The room was prettily decorated by Miss Maud Allen, and the ladies of the association and other friends provided a beautiful repast, after which the Rev. Mr. Hamlyn gave a cheery and practical address. This was followed by short speeches from several of the men, expressive of gratitude to the friends present, and by the singing of old familiar songs, and the company separated mutually gratified by the general pleasure afforded by the gathering of the afternoon.

FREETHINKERS IN CONVENTION.—Prominent freethinkers from all parts of the United States and Canada are gathering at Portsmouth, Ohio, to participate in the 14th annual congress of the American secular union. Among those present are Charles Watts, of Toronto, and Col. Robert Ingersoll. Plans are being decided upon for the inauguration of a national agitation in support of the following demands: The equitable taxation of church property in common with other property, the total discontinuance of religious instruction and worship in the public schools and especially the reading of the Bible.

Victory For the Abegweits.

The Abegweits, of Charlottetown, played football with the Wanderers here to-day, and defeated the home team rather easily by a score of four to nothing. The Abegweits play the Dalhousie College to-morrow.

ELECTIONS IN THE STATES.

Democratic Gains.

McKINLEY ADMITS HIS DEFEAT.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 6. The Legislature stands Senate Republican, 8; Democrats, 18. The House Republican, 134; Democrats, 117. One place to be heard from. The Legislature will have to settle the Government matters.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 6. A Canton special says that McKinley concedes Warwick's election by about 300.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 6. The Democrats have elected eleven of the thirteen Congress men and the Legislature will be Democrat on a joint ballot by 63.

OMAHA, Nov. 6. Boyd, Democrat, has been elected Governor. The Farmers' Alliance have the Legislature and two Congressmen.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 6. The State delegation to Congress will stand six Republicans and five Democrats.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 6. Returns and estimates from all the counties in the state give Wilson (Republican) for congress a plurality of 6900. Olympia, for capital, has 17099 majority. The Republicans have elected 31 state senators, and the Democrats two. The house stands: Republicans 23, Democrats 15.

Ottawa Notes.

THANKSGIVING DAY was generally observed here to-day. Mr. Trudeau, Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals has been appointed Chief Engineer of Canals in conjunction with his present position, thereby effecting a saving of four thousand dollars in departmental salaries.

Pending the acceptance of certain modifications suggested by the Government, the contract for the Atlantic fast mail service has been awarded to the Hartington syndicate. The terms require a weekly service of an average speed of nineteen knots, the steamer to be first-class in requirements in every respect, and to make their exclusive western terminus in Canadian ports.

Arrangements have been made by which two of the six commissions in the imperial army, offered to Canadian militia officers, may be utilized in addition to the four now awarded to the Kingston College graduates. This is intended to take annually two of the second year students to Kingston, and by giving them commissions in the military for two years, qualify them for application for the necessary imperial examination.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, Nov. 6. Thanksgiving day passed off quietly. The weather was beautiful. The North British Society held its annual meeting this evening, George S. Campbell being elected President.

The crew formerly on the steamer Napoleon III. have arrived and begun refitting the old Arctic steamer Alert, which has been lying in a dismantled state at the Marine and Fisheries wharf. She will be prepared to perform the work the wrecked steamer should have done.

Restriction Wanted.

MONTREAL, Nov. 6. The egg exporters from Western Ontario and Quebec met here to-day and adopted resolutions asking the Dominion Government to impose a duty of five cents per dozen on all eggs coming into Canada.

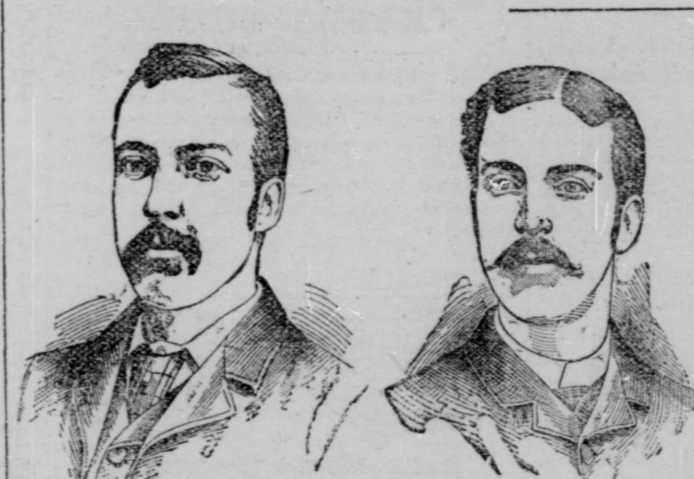

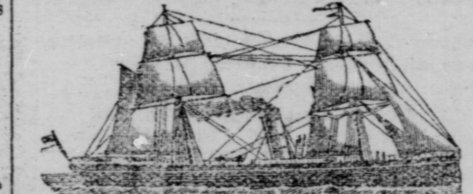
