The Man for the First District.

We are pleased to learn that the Hon. Mr. Gavin is in the field as the Government candidate for the First District of Prince County.

The electors of that District have now an opportunity of correcting the error of their previous choice.

By the influence of a most unscrupulous character, a gentleman of good ability, education, and of unblemished character, was then defeated by Mr. John A. Matheson.

However estimable in private life, Mr. Matheson does not possess any of the qualifications necessary in a public man; and, that his return at the late general election was due to "ledger influence," pressed to an extent for a long time unknown in this Island, is notorious.

It remains to be seen whether the same influences will be invoked in the present contest.

At all events, it is now in order for the freemen of the First District of Prince County to enter an emphatic protest against such malpractices, and by an overwhelming majority to return Mr. Gavin.

It is pleasing to know that the determined effort made by Mr. Gavin's opponents to deprive the country of his public services by attacking his property qualification, has ended in failure. The doubts on this subject, caused by Judge Hensley's decision, are now happily removed.

The Public Accounts.

The Government and their officials deserve great credit for the promptitude they have displayed in placing clear and comprehensive reports of the various departments before the Legislature and the country.

We are all, of course, very much interested in the financial result of the administration during the past year; and, in the admirable report of the Provincial Auditor, the information we desire is easily found.

The result is a deficit of \$23,763 12; so that the credit of \$11,414 19 in favor of the Province at the end of the previous year, has been changed to a debit, at the end of last year, amounting to \$12,348 93.

The change is, of course, not satisfactory. But it is, at all events, pleasing to note that it is not at all due to extravagance or want of care on the part of the Government. The following is a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the past year:—

By comparing the total expenditure of 1882 with that of 1881, our readers will find that it is actually less by \$4,047 48!

Considering that two General Elections were held last year at a cost of \$4,571,36, that there was necessarily an increase in the cost of education, and that it was contended by their opponents that the Government had, in 1881, been as economical as they could be,—we think it will be admitted that, though there is a deficit, the Government have not misused the people's money, and that they deserve credit for their economical management.

To what, then, is the deficit due? It is due largely to a falling off in the receipts of the Land Office. In 1881 these receipts amounted to \$64,831.75; and, in 1882 they were only \$46,130.60—a decrease of no less than \$18,701.15!

Had the receipts of the Land Office been equal to those of the previous year, the expenditures of last year would have

been within about \$5,000 of the receipts, notwithstanding the fact that for the first time in over twenty years, no special tax was imposed upon the people.

It is worthy of note that in 1877, though the Davies-Stewart Government took from the people taxes to the sum of \$45,583, the admitted deficit of that year was \$5,357.49.

The economical change effected by the present Government is seen in the fact that in 1877 the (admitted) expenditures of the late Government amounted to \$331,632—or \$74,404 more than the sum expended last year!

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

OFFICIAL SUMMARY.

FRIDAY, March 30.

Mr. SPEAKER took the Chair at 4 1/2. Mr. PROWSE (from the Committee on Private Bills) submitted reports on Bills to incorporate the "Sisters of Charity," and "Herald Printing Company," and to enable George Tweedy to practice at the Bar of this Province—recommending that a fee of \$12 be charged for each.

Report adopted. Mr. CAMPBELL moved that the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to further consider certain resolutions respecting the amendment of the "Road Act, 1879." Motion carried.

House in Committee. Mr. Holland in the Chair. The following resolution was determined:—Resolved, That any overseers of highways who neglect to perform the duties required to be performed under the 24th section of the 42nd Vic., cap. 1, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$100, and any such fine shall be used for and recovered in the manner prescribed in the 56th section of the said recited Act.

Mr. PERRY thought the proposed Act a move in the right direction. Often in the winter, travellers suffer because the roads are not properly broken. The duties of overseers should, in this respect, be more clearly defined. In his opinion, Commutation money should be expended in the Road District in which it is paid, and, in winter, bushes should be placed at the turns leading into the fields.

Mr. J. R. McLEAN remarked that persons who worked on the roads are required to work fifteen hours, while those who pay are required to pay only 75 cents.

Mr. FARQUHARSON thought if money was accepted as a commutation of the road work, it should be equivalent to fifteen hours work. He hoped that a sum would be placed in the estimates to pay the cost of breaking winter roads—at least in the vicinity of Charlottetown. Many poor people would be glad to earn a little money in this way, and means should be afforded to fill in the pitches and make the roads passable.

Mr. FERGUSON said that when the Act was amended in 1880 the hon. member for West River thought it was all right except for the discrepancy between the commutation money and the work required to be done. The Statute Labor is being fairly well performed, and is giving good satisfaction. He believed that the people were satisfied with the principles of the Bill.

Mr. SINCLAIR said the road work was generally accomplished in a day and a half. He thought it could not be done in much less time, and that as much as was generally done on the roads by a man could be obtained for seventy-five cents. He thought the inhabitants should be required to break the roads in winter; but that there should also be a fund to keep the pitches down.

Mr. GORDON endorsed the sentiments of the hon. member for Strathalbyn. He had not heard complaints about the fifteen hours labor required. All parties seemed to be well satisfied. No doubt, more importance should be attached to the breaking of the winter roads. Motion carried.

Mr. CAMPBELL moved that the resolution be filled with the word "five." Motion carried. Mr. SPEAKER resumed the chair and the resolutions were reported agreed to.

Mr. SULLIVAN presented a Bill entitled "An Act to authorize the registration of a certain deed." The Bill was read a first time.

Mr. FERGUSON moved that the House do now resolve itself into a committee of the whole, to consider certain resolutions respecting the manufacture of butter and cheese. He said it is well known that several cheese factories have been established in the Province. These factories are found to be a great benefit to the farmer; and there seems to be no good reason why these interests should not be as well developed here as in Ontario or elsewhere in Canada. In fact, this Province is, in some respects, better suited than the other Provinces for the production of butter and cheese. The object of the Bill is to protect factories from the fraud of unscrupulous persons who may adulterate the milk sent to them or take away part of the cream. Motion carried.

House in Committee. Mr. Bentley in the Chair.

Mr. FERGUSON submitted the following resolution:—

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to introduce a Bill to protect and encourage the manufacture of butter and cheese in this Province. 2. Resolved, That whosoever shall knowingly and fraudulently sell, supply, bring or send to be manufactured in any cheese or butter factory in this Province, any milk diluted with water, or in any way adulterated, or from which cream has been taken, or any butter or cheese manufacturer who shall knowingly or fraudulently use or direct any of his or her employees to use for his or her individual benefit, any cream from the milk brought to any butter or cheese factory without the consent of all the owners thereof, shall for each and every such wrongful act, forfeit and pay a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, in the discretion of the presiding Justice or Justices of the Peace, before whom the case shall be heard.

Mr. GONDEX thought the House should be cautious in passing such a law. Who is to judge whether adulteration has been practised? The quality of the milk varies in different sections of the country and in different cows. Who is to test the milk to see that it has been diluted or otherwise tampered with.

Mr. FERGUSON said the adulteration of

milk could be ascertained by scientific men, but there is no means of knowing whether or not some of the cream has been taken off. Of course the Magistrate would have to be satisfied by satisfactory evidence before a conviction could be obtained. The Bill was similar to one in operation in Ontario.

Mr. SINCLAIR thought it would not be advisable to confine a magistrate to the imposition of a fine of a certain amount. Let there be a limit, and the fine made commensurate with the offence at the discretion of the magistrate.

Mr. PROWSE and Mr. Martin thought the suggestion a good one. Resolutions adopted. Mr. FERGUSON moved that the blanks in the resolution be filled up with the words "one" and "twenty." Carried.

Mr. SPEAKER resumed the Chair. Mr. FERGUSON presented a Bill to be entitled "An Act to protect the manufacture of Butter and Cheese." The Bill was read a first time.

After recess.—Mr. SULLIVAN submitted the Public Accounts, 1882; also the annual report of the Public Schools, 1882; also the annual report of the trustees of the Medical Hospital for the Insane.

Mr. CAMPBELL submitted the Report of Public Works, 1882.

Mr. FERGUSON submitted the Report of the Commissioner of Public Lands, 1882; also the Report of the Commissioners for the Provincial Exhibition, 1882; also the report of the Commissioners of the Government Stock Farm, 1882; also the accounts of the Provincial Treasurer, 1882.

Mr. SULLIVAN presented a Bill to be entitled "An Act to further amend the Public Schools Act, 1877." The Bill was read a first time.

Mr. McLEOD presented a petition from Peter M. Bourke, William Brown, and others, praying for the passage of an Act to incorporate the Mill View Creamery Company, and submitted a Bill in accordance therewith. The Bill was read a first time, and referred to the Committee on Private Bills.

House adjourned. C.

Mr. Morrison Heady, the blind and deaf Kentucky poet, has been visiting New Orleans and astonishing his acquaintances there by his extraordinary skill as a chess-player. He plays upon a board so contrived that the pieces fit into sockets, and by the aid of touch alone he plans ingenious campaigns, repulses attacks, and analyzes the most intricate situations. A glove upon his hand with the alphabet printed upon it, is the medium by which he receives communications. To converse with him one must spell out his words by touching the letters on the glove.

Great advance is being made in the art of storing electricity. A train running from London to Brighton has been lighted with incandescent lamps supplied by Faure accumulators. At first it took seventy accumulators to run eighteen lamps; now, Faure-Sellon-Volckmar cells are used, and thirty of them furnish forty lamps. Thus, the objection to the storing of electricity that the cells took up too much space is being rapidly dissipated.

New York has just had a case illustrative of the danger of treating every one found unconscious on the streets as intoxicated. A woman who was picked up apparently drunk and thrust into the cells in an unconscious condition was found in the morning to be dying from a fractured skull, and expired a few hours later. There is loud demand for an intelligent examination of all persons arrested about whose condition there is the slightest room for doubt.

A kite was made near Rochester, N. Y., recently of lumber two inches wide by half an inch in thickness. It was covered with Manila paper and the surface contained nearly 250 square feet. The string by which the kite was flown was of three-eighth-inch rope and 5,000 feet in length. It shot into the air like a balloon, and after floating a mile high for two hours was only brought down by means of a pulley and train.

THE COAL RIOTS.—Twenty-five non-commissioned officers and men of Sydney volunteer militia, under command of Capt. Hill, arrived at Lennox on the 28th, and are quartered in the Reading Room building. After their arrival the manager got men to work the engines, pumping the water, and will resume raising coal as soon as the water is pumped out. County Constable Musgrave and assistants arrested two of the rioters and lodged them in the guard room. The constables are now in search of the other rioters. All is quiet.

The Dominion line steamer Oregon, Capt. Williams, arrived at Halifax on Tuesday from Liverpool, G. B., after a passage of ten days, and docked at the deep water wharf. She is a new four-masted steamer of 2,450 tons register, and 3,760 tons gross, is 369 feet long, 41 feet beam and 36 feet deep. She was built on the Clyde this year, this being her first trip. She is splendidly fitted with all modern improvements, having a music room in addition to the other requirements of a first-class steamer, and has accommodation for 100 saloon, 30 intermediate and about 1,400 steerage passengers. The Oregon has 3,800 tons of freight, 1,100 tons to be landed there and 2,700 tons at Portland. She also brought 6 cabin passengers, 20 intermediate and 20 steerage.
