Despatch of 5th says 2,000 men are concentrated along the line of Detroit and St. Clair Rivers. Main concentration is about Prescott, that being considered the real point of attack.

Buffalo, June 5.

The Fenian prisoners by United States Steamer *Michigan* will make defence confessing breach of neutrality laws. Volunteers on Niagara Ferry House shot down their prisoners when they found them. It is thought Fenians will make a stand near Cornwall. Collision expected every moment. It is said Beauharnois Canal cut from Cotan Dulie to St. Lawrence.

Gen. Sprar with 3,000 men is to move from Philipsburgh, to cut railroad at St. John's junction, and the Grand Trunk at St. Hilaire and St. Hyacinthe. These operations supposed will cut off Montreal from succor.

Buffalo's special despatch says, men shot at Fort Erie were British Deserters. U. S. Troops arriving along the line.

They hold Fort Erie, Windsor, Sarnia, &c.**Railroad and Telegraph Wires Destroyed!**

N. Y. June 1st.—It is reported that Fort Erie in Canada, opposite Buffalo, has been captured by the Fenians who are represented to be 3,000 strong, and 2,000 of whom are said to be marching unopposed into the interior and to have already cut one telegraph line.

Buffalo, 11, a. m.—The Fenians have torn up the Railroad track and destroyed all the telegraph cables at the terminus of the Grand Trunk railroad between Black Rock and Fort Erie.

A despatch from Buffalo confirms the capture of Fort Erie by 1500 Fenians instead of 5000.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 1.—Notwithstanding the vigilance of the authorities the U. S. steamer *Michigan* being under steam and having her ports open, and the fact that the city is swarming with Canadian spies, several regiments of Fenians crossed over into Canada last night, including troops from Kentucky, Tennessee, and Indiana, a regiment from Ohio and a regiment from this city. At this point they crossed in Canal boats drawn by Tugs, and when nearing the Canadian shore set up wild Irish cheers with the green flag floating.

Col. O'Neil of the 13th Regiment of Nashville is in command at Fort Erie.

A large number of persons are viewing the sight from the shore.

Col. O'Neil threatened to bayonet a man who attempted to appropriate a large wollen shawl found in a public house.

Reported Fenians have some British prisoners.
