Plans For Community Centre At Murray River

Plans to build a new community centre at Murray River were formulated at a special meeting held at the Murray River School last evening. The meeting was attended by a large number of interested residents of the community who discussed the plans at considerable length with excellent results forthcoming. Officers elected for the development of the proposed project are president, Dr. M. L. Bonnell; vice-president, E. K. Johnston; secretary-treasurer, George Ferguson.

The centre, to be known as the Southern King's Community Centre, will include basketball, volleyball, badminton, bowling, billiards and table tennis. It is planned to use the centre as a point for gatherings to promote the physical and social development of the community, the first through play activities, the second through association and interchange of ideas. An entertainment committee has been formed to put on a concert to get the idea underway.

Another meeting will be held in the school next Monday night to discuss further plans for the centre.
