Cancer Research Continuing, Officials Inform P.E.I. Society

Some 50,000 tests have been made in the United States and Canada in a search for a chemical compound that would deal with the cancer cell, the executive national director of the Canadian Society told a meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening.

Dr. Robert Taylor of Toronto, who is also a vice-president of the Cancer Institute, went on to say that there is also considerable interest among researchers in the possibility of finding a virus-like tumor factor in cancer. Such a factor has been found in connection with some animal cancers.

George Pifner, also of Toronto, executive secretary of the Canadian Cancer Society also addressed the meeting, which was presided over by Wendall H. Beaton, president of the P.E.I. Cancer Society.

Elderly Resident Dies In Hospital

The death occurred Sunday at the Charlottetown Hospital of Henry Philip Gaudet in his 68th year.

A native of Oyster Bed Bridge, Mr. Gaudet came to Charlottetown where he took up employment with the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company and the Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. before leaving for Brandon, Manitoba where he worked with the CNR.

The late Mr. Gaudet left Manitoba in 1918 to take up employment with the car works at Trenton, N.S. He returned to Charlottetown in 1929 to join the staff of the Maritime Electric where he remained until his retirement ten years later.

Following his retirement, Mr. Gaudet operated a grocery store on Richmond Street for about eight years.

Left to mourn his passing is one son Harold of this city, also three brothers, Arthur, former publisher of the Patriot, Charlottetown; Jack of Montague and Louis of Kenora, Ontario.

He was predeceased by his wife, the former Mae Lafferty, city; a son, Edward who died in Trenton, three sisters, Emma, Josie (Mrs. Ray Rogers) and Sophie (Mrs. William Robertson). Three brothers also predeceased him, Frank, Fred and Rudolph.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday morning from the residence of his son, Harold, 267 Sydney Street to St. Dunstan's Basilica. Interment will be in the Roman Catholic cemetery.
