The Governor-General's Speech.

The following paragraph was accidentally, (we suppose) omitted from the Governor-General's speech, as telegraphed to the EXAMINER. Those of our contemporaries who appropriated the EXAMINER's telegram (without acknowledgement) will please take notice:—

Hon Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

Bills for the better organization of the Civil Service, for the consolidation of the Inland Revenue laws and for the amendment of the acts relating to the Dominion lands, to the Public Works, to the Indians of the Northwest and to the mounted Police force, will be laid before you. The acts incorporating the Banks of the Dominion will expire next year and the present would seem a favorable time for a full consideration of our banking system and of the subject of the currency as connected with that system. The subject of the laws relating to insolvency will doubtless engage your attention. The increasing foreign trade of Canada and the prospect that her Majesty's Government will enter ere long into negotiations with foreign nations on the subject of their trade and commercial relations, demand our closest attention and watchfulness while the rapid development of the Dominion is continually giving rise to important matters requiring the support and action of the Imperial Government. With the concurrence of Her Majesty, I therefore recommend you to sanction the appointment of a permanent representative of Canada in London to guard her various interests. The subjects I have mentioned are of great importance. I commend them with full confidence in your wisdom and patriotism to your best consideration.

THE Empress of Austria has given \$200 to the Duchess of Marlborough's fund.

THERE is every probability that the Socialist laws will be prolonged another period of two years.

PRESIDENT HAYES has issued a proclamation warning all persons from trespassing upon the land of the Indian Territory.

THE London Sportsman announces that Boyd refused to challenge Haslan at present on account of business engagements.

ON Tuesday morning last a counterfeit two dollar note of the Union Bank of P. E. I. was offered to the station master at Dorchester.—St. John Sun.

It is understood that the British American Bank Note Company of Montreal intend to re-open their establishment in Ottawa at an early day.

In the Manitoba Legislature a measure has been adopted to enable any member holding a Federal appointment to retain his seat in the Local House.

THE Irish National Land League have passed a resolution thanking the United States Congress for acceding the privileges of the floor of the house to Parnell.

HALIFAX, disappointed in the Provincial Exhibition, which is to be held at Kentville this year, is determined to have one of her own in October, Art, Floral and Industrial.

THE salary of the Czar is \$17.40 a minute. It seems good pay when one does not remember that his principal occupation is that of being shot at by some of his beloved subjects.

CHARLES LAMB said of a chumsy girl who was always running against things and breaking them, "Mary, I believe that girl would break the Bank of England if she should run against it."

THE SHEEP TRADE.—The "Sackville Post" says that sheep still continue to go forward to the American market. A few days ago Messrs. Ed. Read and Timothy Hicks shipped 365 head, and on Tuesday 180 more.

THE St. John "Telegraph" says that a leading member of the House of Commons of Canada will, this session, introduce a bill to legalize marriage with a deceased wife's sister.

Hitherto the property of persons dying intestate without known heirs in the Duchy of Cornwall has lapsed to the Crown, but it is now established that it belongs to the Prince of Wales as Duke of Cornwall.

102 YEARS OLD.—A Waterford, Kings Co., correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: Mr. Robt. Wallace, who was born in County Antrim, Ireland, in 1778, died here on Sunday. Mr. Wallace was able to move around up to the last of the week. He joined the British army at the time of the Irish Rebellion in 1803. He marched to Waterloo in 1815, but the battle was over before his regiment came up.

Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9.

It seems as though the politicians would never be done speculating about the late Republic Convention in Pennsylvania. The more it is talked about the more general the opinion becomes that Cameron didn't gain so much of a victory as he tried to make it appear, and the less confident the Grant people appear to be of having "captured" the entire delegation, as they claimed they would in advance. Senator Blaine's friends grow more happy relative to it, and some of them who ought to know whereof they speak, say that more than one half the entire delegation will prove to be Blaine men.

Next comes New York to give us political excitement, for the National Capital feels quickly the influence of political events in all the States. It doesn't appear that the "Cameron plan" will be tried then in behalf of the Grant boom, although a little sharp practice was developed by the ringleaders in Albany. The primary elections in that State will be fair and in consequence the best judges say that New York's delegation will be a divided one, and without instructions. Should Senator Conkling be a candidate, as it is possible he may, he will have a solid vote, but if not it is estimated that Senator Blaine will have the larger part, General Grant coming next, while Secretary Sherman will have a few from the city districts perhaps.

The Republicans of the District of Columbia, on Saturday, selected two delegates to the Chicago convention, both of whom are friends of Mr. Blaine, although the Grant people ran one of them as their man. The plan of opening the Indian Territory for settlement is not abandoned, but will be presented shortly in a new form, it is said. There is no mistake about the determination of some of the Western and Southern members to carry that measure if possible.

The subject of American control of whatever scheme is adopted for connecting the commerce of the Atlantic and Pacific is growing more and more engrossing here. The energy displayed by the French party under Lesseps serves to give our people concern against them, and there is a genuine fear lest the European powers should, in trying to, seize too much of a foothold on this Continent. It is well for our Government to be prepared to foil the effort, and to place our own people in a position to control this great interest. Whether the Isthmus is cut by a canal, or what is more likely, spanned by a gigantic marine railway, the people of the United States ought to have a controlling interest in it, because it concerns them more than any others.

The Patent Semaphore for the Production of Maritime Signals.

Says the Ottawa Citizen of Tuesday: The Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals and of Public Works, Hon. P. Fortin, M. P., and other gentlemen and Government officials, inspected the working of Mr. Gisborne's invention, the patent semaphore, yesterday. The peculiar advantages, demonstrated by this novel apparatus, for utilizing the universal code of all nations, in the production of Maritime signals, the impossibility of error in communication with vessels at sea or to and from insular lighthouses, and the extreme simplicity of its mechanism, at once commanded attention and approval. It is claimed that the invention will prove invaluable in connection with Dr. Fortin's admirable system for coast signalling and fishery bulletins, already inaugurated in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

THE semi-official "North German Gazette," referring to the warlike interpretation by the French newspapers of the German Army Bill, says: "The French army estimates in 1870 were barely five million francs, while they now exceed nine hundred million. The French army is better armed and numerically stronger than the German army. The Russian army also has been considerably increased. From the language of some French Monarchical journals it would appear certain that if the parties they represent obtained power they would immediately plunge France into war. In view of this danger, Germany, though earnestly desiring peace, must for her own safety follow the example unfortunately set by her neighbors in their immense armaments. Germany's army is her weapon of defence and not of attack. We would be very glad if the same could be said with certainty of the armies of our neighbors."
