DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Supplementary Estimates.

P. E. Island's Share.

A Large Grant for Defences.

OTTAWA, March 28.

The final supplementary estimates were submitted yesterday. The total of the item is \$1,501,825.52. P. E. Island grants—under the head of harbors and rivers are comprised the reconstruction of Souris Breakwater, \$20,000; heavy repairs to Sturgeon Wharf, \$1,000; dredging at Cape Traverse, \$4,000; repairs to breakwater, dredging, etc., at Wood Islands, \$6,000; repairs and construction of new wing to the North Rustico Breakwater, \$1,000. A new dredge is to be provided for the Maritime Provinces for which there is a grant of \$15,000. Among the grants on account of Indians is one of \$150 to complete a house for the teachers at Lennox Island school, P. E. I. Probably the most important and the most significant item in these estimates is a grant of \$105,000 towards the defence of Equinox, B. C., \$35,000 of the grant being to cover the pay of a detachment of Royal Marine Artillery and Royal Engineers. Among the militia items is also a sum of \$17,212 for gratuities to officers of the active militia staff who are to be placed on the retired list. For the purchase of modern firearms the sum of \$16,500 is asked. The British Columbia members will feel happy over a grant of \$100,000 for a new Post Office at Victoria. For harbors and rivers the total of grants by Provinces are: Nova Scotia, \$7,874; P. E. Island, \$32,400; New Brunswick, \$10,250; Quebec, \$32,100; Ontario, \$49,510; British Columbia, \$4,200.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Balfour's Motion of Censure Defeated.

LONDON, March 28.

In the House of Commons debate last night, the vote on Balfour's motion that the Irish executive should be censured for condoning serious offences, and thus bringing the law into general contempt, resulted in a majority of forty-seven for the Government.

Montreal Herald Burned Out.

MONTREAL, March 28.
The Herald newspaper has again gone up in smoke, a fire having broken out in the office last evening at 10 o'clock. Before 11.30 the entire establishment was a total wreck. The building on Victoria Square was completely gutted. The Herald's loss will be about \$35,000. It is insured to the extent of \$22,000.

The French Treaty.

OTTAWA, March 28.
Minister Foster made the promised statement with regard to the French treaty. He said he didn't think there were any more papers to be brought down. Communications were still going on, but had not yet come to the point where he could make any definite statement. He hoped to do so to-morrow.

Civil Service Superannuation.

OTTAWA, March 28.
The civil service superannuation bill has passed through committee. Mr. Foster said it would be followed to-day by a bill to furnish civil servants with the safest and cheapest life insurance possible.

The House adjourned at one o'clock, having passed all railway estimates in supply.
