IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Dec. 15.

Assize Courts in various quarters of Ireland are now sitting and dealing with the agrarian crimes, which for the past few months have been creating the terrorism that now exists. Four of the leading judges in Ireland have delivered their charges to the Grand Jury, beginning a week ago at Cork with the Right Hon. J. D. Fitzgerald, of the Queen's Bench, and ending yesterday in Ulster with the Right Hon. James Anthony Lawson, of the Common Pleas. Judge Fitzgerald furnishes the following list of crimes in the Province of Munster:—

SOUTHEAST AND WEST.

The picture held up by Judge Barry at Waterford is not so dark, showing that the spirit of agrarianism is less strong in Tipperary, Waterford, Wexford and Kilkenny, though a considerable increase in that class of crime is reported. The principal case before this court is the murder of Boyd. But Baron Dowse, of the Exchequer Division, had a most remarkable list of crime to bring before the jury at Galway:—

Baron Dowse concluded his charge as follows:—"I will take the liberty of saying, for I think it is the time and place to do so, that if this state of affairs is allowed to continue much longer the consequence will be immediate danger to Ireland and ultimate disgrace to the Empire of which she forms a part. No true friend of Ireland, no real lover of liberty, can dare to approve of the state of the facts which I lay before you. I speak not alone in the interest of the victims of this 'reign of terror,' as it is properly called, but also in the interests of the poor people themselves, who are too often the tools of men who are more crafty and designing than they are. I speak of the whole country. Every part of it, from north to south, from east to west, feels the terrible influence of this dreadful disease,

some of the most dangerous symptoms of which I have laid before you. I hope it is not out of character for me to say that I fervently pray to God that this cloud of discontent and crime which is brooding over this province may be speedily removed; and that peace and happiness, truth and justice may be once more established within its borders."

DUBLIN, Dec. 16.

Twenty-four jurors have been struck for the trial of the Land Leaguers, none of whom have taken part in the political agitation now going on in Ireland.

A despatch from Dublin to the *Times* says the action of the Cabinet in regard to the Irish question is awaited with intense anxiety by the loyal classes, but with affected indifference by the Land League and their sympathizers. The most strenuous and desperate opposition may be expected to coercion, all that physical endurance can do to prevent. Suspension of the habeas corpus act may be anticipated. The *Times* publishes a letter from the authorities of Dublin to a person, appointing him High Sheriff of a certain county for the year 1881, and the reply to the letter. The reply says that the person declines the appointment because, owing to the state of the country, his rental is so diminished that he cannot afford the expenses of the office, adding that the Government, having allowed the country to verge on a state of anarchy and rebellion, the responsibility and dangers of the office are more than he is willing to incur.

The Dublin correspondent of the *Manchester Guardian* says the military authorities have collected camp requisites at convenient stations all over the country, and the Commissariat has accumulated a reserve of portable provisions in every town. Orders were issued to-day for the second battalion of the Rifle Brigade, expected home from Malta, to land at Queenstown instead of proceeding to England.

EUROPEAN.

VIENNA, Dec. 16.

The Emperor and Crown Prince Rudolph have declined a ball at the Opera House, tendered by the citizens on the occasion of the marriage of the Crown Prince, and have requested that the money intended to be appropriated for that entertainment shall be given to the poor of Vienna, at the same time offering liberal contributions themselves for the same purpose. This is the result of a scandal created by the Town Council appointing a committee to investigate rumors that the Crown Prince had ordered furniture and household equipments, for his new establishment, from Paris. The appointment of the committee was accompanied by severe comments of the members of the Municipal Council on the Royal family patronizing foreign tradesmen. The inquiry showed these rumors to be false, and at the moment when the committee was making a report to that effect, a letter was received from the Minister President of the Imperial Council, informing the Burgomaster that the Emperor and Crown Prince must decline the city's hospitality.

LONDON, Dec. 16.

The Porte's latest note on the Greek Question suggests as a basis of negotiation the proposal made by the Porte in its note of October 3rd, namely, that the cession of territory should not include Janina, Metzoua and Larissa. This proposal has been hitherto utterly scouted by Greece.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 15.

The Porte, in a note, says that the military preparations of Greece have been pushed forward until the whole country is one vast camp; that the press influence the people by violent articles against Turkey; that brigandage is carried on on a large scale, and formidable bands cross the frontier, but that the Porte will remain calm while taking precautions against possible attacks.

LONDON, Dec. 16.

Mr. Gladstone and Earl Granville, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, had a protracted conference yesterday.

ROME, Dec. 16.

The Pope has issued an encyclical letter exhorting the Priests, Archbishops, and Bishops of the Catholic world to stimulate their flocks to pray, work, and contribute in aid of the Apostolic Foreign Mission, as represented by the work of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, and the Schools in the East.

LONDON, Dec. 16.

Philip Callan, member of Parliament, for Louth, Ireland, who was convicted of libelling Mr. A. Sullivan, was sentenced to pay a fine of £25.

The British S. S. "City of Montreal," Capt. Davies, from Quebec, Nov. 10th, for Greenock, has been passed at sea, abandoned and rudderless, in 29 degrees west longitude, 47 degrees north latitude.

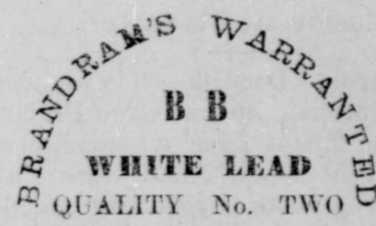
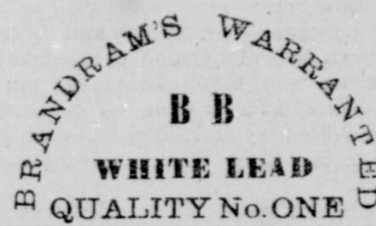
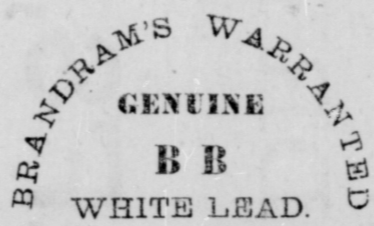
