

# Epsom Derby Said Roughest & Toughest Ever

EPSON, England (AP) — The 11th running of the Epsom Derby today was the richest ever.

Thursday it was called the roughest and toughest. Parthena, England's latest race-

horse, woke up Wednesday for just two minutes and 36 seconds to romp home and win a record \$101,018 for owner Sir Humphrey de Trafford.

But in the unsaddling enclosure after the 1½-mile turf classic, French banker Baron Guy de Rothschild, whose 11-2 favorite, Shantung, came in third, complained:

"My horse would have won by 100 yards, but he was crashed into. It was terrible thing to happen. Shantung was almost knocked over."

"He took a terrific bump after only about three furlongs. He had to drop back to last and he was a good 100 yards behind the leaders when they came into the home stretch."

"He would have won easily if it hadn't been for that bump." Jockey Fred Palmer called his mount the "unluckiest Derby favorite ever."

Explained Palmer: "After about half a mile I was following Princlion, when a horse on the outside ran into him. Princlion was brought to his knees. Shantung ran into one of Princlion's hind legs and Shantung's forelegs were badly cut."

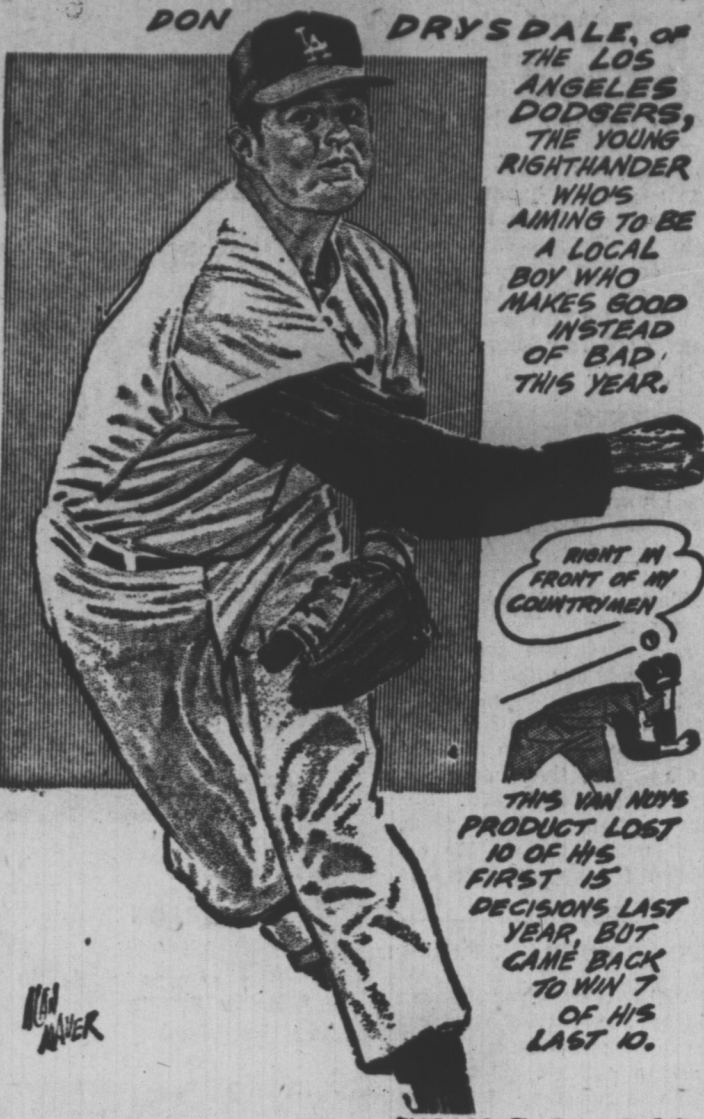

# Pale Hose Are In Front; Yanks Crush Tigers 14-3

Chicago White Sox are, in first place in the American League today thanks to Earl Torgeson, whose 17th inning homer gave Al Lopez' team a 6-5 victory over Baltimore Orioles.

Victory Thursday in the majors' longest game of the year gave the White Sox a half game lead over idle Cleveland Indians, who had led virtually from the start of the season.

Seventh place New York Yankees advanced within two percentage points of fifth by defeating Detroit Tigers 14-3. Boston's last place Red Sox triumphed over Kansas City Athletics 5-2.

Washington did not play. San Francisco's Giants, paced by Orlando Cepeda's two home runs and seven runs batted in, walloped Milwaukee 11-5 to narrow the Braves' first place lead in the National League to 2½ games. Pittsburgh made it three in a row over St. Louis with a 9-3 triumph.

Torgeson's game-winning blow was struck off Jerry Walker after the youthful Baltimore right-hander had disposed of the first two batters in the 17th. The game took 4 hours and 37 minutes. Victory went to Bob Shaw.

sixth Chicago pitcher. He entered the game in the 13th with the score tied at 4-4. Baltimore jumped in front in that inning on Chico Carrasquel's single, a sacrifice and Albie Pearson's single, but the Sox tied the score in their half on Torgeson's single and a throwing error by Willie Miranda.

Whitely Ford not only limited the Tigers to seven hits but hit a home run and double and drove in three runs as the Yankees made it two in a row over the Tigers. It was Ford's sixth victory against three defeats. Elston Howard and Hector Lopez also homered for the Yankees, who handed Jim Bunning his fourth loss.

Outfielder Gary Geiger drove in three runs with a home run and single as the Red Sox snapped Kansas City's winning streak at five. Rookie Jerry Casale halted

the A's with seven hits that included a homer by Joe DeMaestri. Rip Coleman was charged with the loss.

The Giants finally caught up with Lew Burdette, the Milwaukee right-hander who had taken 13 in-a-row from them since Sept. 16, 1954. They banged him out of the box in a four-run fifth inning and went on to amass 15 hits, four by Cepeda. Gordon Jones, who replaced started Mike McCormick in the fourth, was given credit for the victory, but Stu Miller saved the game with five scoreless relief innings.

Bill Virdon, Bill Mazeroski and Don Hoak each drove in two runs to help Pittsburgh's Ronnie Kline notch his fifth victory. Rookie Ernie Broglio of St. Louis was tagged with the defeat, his fourth without a victory. Stan Musial got two of the Cards' 13 hits. One was the 651st double of his career, tying him with Hans Wagner for the National League record. Only American Leaguers Tris Speaker, with 793, and Ty Cobb, with 724, hit more two baggers.

Los Angeles played at Cincinnati and Chicago at Philadelphia in night games.

### June Is The Month of Life, Columnist Takes Stock

June is the month of life. Red fox cubs play in the sun and pint sized rabbits nibble at clover leaves while broods of black ducks scatter and dive for cover when surprised in the open. When watching a litter of fox cubs at play an hour passes in a matter of minutes. They'll pounce and wrestle like kittens or play tug-of-war with slender root stalks or dead weeds. I visited a den a few evenings ago. I imagine by the look of things the mother will be leaving the den and wandering far afield very shortly. The cubs are getting quite venturesome. A farmer working afield nearby told me he watched the mother carrying a barn rat denward and when she neared the site two cubs, like curious children, met her some distance from the den. She uttered a sharp command, and they scampered back to cover. The mother fox, seeing she was under observation kept right on going to return later when the coast was clear.

The farmer wondered where she snaffled the barn rat. The common rat also likes the great outdoors and with the coming of spring often leaves the farm buildings and takes to the country. I have seen their burrows in dykes at the edge of grain fields on many occasions. A mother fox

## RE SUMMER STORE HOURS IN OUR P.E.I. MUNICIPALITIES

## CBC Has Hopes Of Televising 24 Big Four Games

OTTAWA (CP) — The CBC hopes to televise 21 of the 28 football games in the Big Four league this fall. CBC Vice-President E.L. Bushnell said Thursday.

But he was non-committal, in the Commons broadcasting committee, to an MP's suggestion that if the CBC had waited it might have got broadcast rights for the games for less than the reported \$312,000.

Egan Chambers (PC—Montreal St. Lawrence St. George) said the Big Four had asked \$350,000 for the rights and got \$312,000.

"Perhaps a month or two from now they might have been happy to take \$220,000." Mr. Bushnell did not confirm the \$312,000 figure—he said that both the CBC and Big Four had agreed not to make it public.

He said the CBC is paying \$125,000 for rights to telecast the Grey Cup game and \$117,000 for rights to games in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

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
