

U.S. Defeats Canada In Davis Cup Competition

Holt, Durrelle Are In Top Condition For Title Scrap

MONTREAL (CP)—Mike Holt, fast approaching razor-sharpness for his British Empire light-heavyweight title fight, disappeared through an unpretentious doorway in Montreal's east end, clambered down a narrow staircase to a tiny basement gymnasium and went to work.

For 30 minutes the South African champion whipped through shadow-boxing, rope-skipping and bag-punching. Six hours earlier he had done four miles of road work. That was the Saturday drill. The Sunday program was the same.

Holt is through with sparring partners. He won't take a belt at anybody again until 11 p.m. ADT Wednesday in Montreal Forum when he meets Yvon Durrelle, the rugged New Brunswick fisherman who is putting his title on the line in the 12-round match.

As Holt worked out, manager Piet Lourens watched intently, stop-watch in hand. Periodically he gave his orders, sometimes in English, sometimes in Afrikaans. **ALWAYS TRAINING**

"He's sharp," said Lourens. "He's in condition. I'm not going to let him leave it in the gym. He's going to take it into the ring with him."

"It's easy to bring him to peak because he keeps in training all the time. Give me four or five days any time and he'll be ready for a fight."

Lourens said he wants to get a pound or so on Holt before the fight. Before the workouts Mike weighs about 171. Afterwards he weighs 169.

"I want him to enter the ring at 172 or 173½," said Lourens.

"In the little gym were other boxers going through workouts. There were no more than a dozen hangers-on, all watching Holt. The gym is a drab-looking place. "At least we have privacy here," said Lourens. "We started

at another place. It was like performing in a theatre. We looked at a second, but I decided I would take this one."

HOLT CONFIDENT

Mike himself is confident he can beat Durrelle but shies away from any sort of prediction.

"I feel fine and I'm ready. I'm certainly not worrying about the fight. That wouldn't do any good. And it would be a peculiar thing, wouldn't it, if I wasn't confident."

Mike has become pretty well acclimatized since his long plane flight from South Africa to Canada.

For a while the seven-hour time difference gave him trouble. He would wake up hungry around 3 or 4 a.m. and then be ready for bed in mid-afternoon.

Outside his training hours, he goes to movies, reads, watches television or listens to the radio.

Durrelle remained in Montreal only one day before going to his Ste. Agathe camp Saturday with manager Chris Shaban and a small entourage. He will continue his workouts up there and expects to return to Montreal late Monday.

Like Holt, he is confident of winning next Wednesday. He said he weighs 174 pounds, one pound under the light-heavyweight limit, and won't have any trouble about his weight between now and weigh-in time Wednesday.

Durrelle showed the finger he injured a few days ago before leaving his home in Baie Ste. Anne. It was black and blue around the nail, which looked as if it eventually will come off. But he said the injury doesn't bother him—he clenched his fist and jabbed—and won't interfere with his fighting.

Elliot Beaten In Half-Mile Race

LONDON (CP) — Australia's under miler Herb Elliott was past in the half-mile race by Britain's Brian Hewson and Canada's Mike Agostini placed third in a photo-finish to the 100-yard dash event in the British Amateur Athletic Association track and field championships here Saturday.

Hewson spurred in the last 100 yards to nip Mike Rawson, another Briton, by about five yards and Elliott who was close behind. Hewson, a sub-four minute miler who tends a London tailor shop, was timed in 1:48.3 to beat the listed British record for 100 yards. Four other British marks fell in the international meet which is a dress rehearsal for the British Empire Games opening Friday at Cardiff, Wales.

Although Agostini, whose home is in Vancouver, registered a 9.9 second time in the 100-yard dash, he was his fastest ever for 800 yards. The United States' Tom Courtney holds the world mark of 1:46.8.

Elliott, who has a 3:57.9 mile performance pending for world record recognition, and Hewson, will meet in the Empire Games mile.

Newman said Miss Russell and he had earlier expressed the desire to fly home by way of Vienna but they also said they did not want to leave before July 14.

Warned To Stop Abusing Umpires

Frank (Shag) Shaughnessy of the International League has issued a directive to the league—leading Montreal Royals ordering Manager Clay Bryant and several players to "stop abusing the umpires—or else."

Shaughnessy said Bryant had threatened bodily harm to three umpires in the runway leading to the clubhouse from the field on Thursday night after the Royals had dropped a 5-2 decision to Rochester Red Wings.

In that game, Bobby (Shanty) Sloan was ejected by umpire Harry Schwartz in the sixth inning after the Montreal shortstop retired on a close play at first base.

Shaughnessy said: "I have instructed my umpires to take no more guff from your players. And no more from you. Your team is the only one in the league causing the officials any trouble."
