The bidding:
East South West North

But this play is demonstrably wrong. South has no real hope of making a ninth trick outside of the club suit. He should therefore seek the line of play that gives the chance of picking up an extra club trick.

If the clubs are divided 3-3, the ninth trick can be set up whether a finesse is taken or not. Provision must be made for a 4-2 club break. There is an indication from the opening lead that West has the heart length. There is a corresponding chance, therefore, that East has the club length.

If East has four or more clubs, whether they include the queen or not, the contract cannot be defeated with correct play. South should first lead the ace of clubs and then a club to the king. It so happens in this hand that the queen falls and the contract is therefore made.

But even if the queen had not fallen—let's say East had started with four to the queen—a low club toward the J-7 would still provide trick number nine. The point is that this method of play guards against a doubleton queen in West's hand, and thus provides added protection.

It is true the recommended play costs a trick if it turns out East was dealt Q-x-x of clubs, but the loss of the 30 points is a minor one compared to the loss of the game. Making the contract is always the first consideration.

Advanced Fisheries-Research Ship Is Launched At Sorel

SOREL, Que. (CP)—The A. T. Cameron, described as one of most modern fisheries-research ships in the world, was launched here Friday.

The ship will go into service in Atlantic and Arctic waters. It will be based at St. John's, Nfld., for about two-thirds of the year and at Halifax the remainder of the time.

The vessel was built for the fisheries research board of Canada by Marine Industries, Ltd. It was named for the late Dr. A. T. Cameron of Winnipeg, who for 13 years prior to his death in 1947 was chairman of the board.

Mrs. J. L. Kask, wife of the present chairman, christened the new ship.

SCIENTIFIC EQUIPMENT
The A. T. Cameron is 177 feet long and 32 feet wide. A crew of 25 will be carried, and there is also accommodation for nine scientists and technicians.

Five laboratories are fitted out with modern equipment and gear for various research procedures as well as oceanographic, hydrographic and survey work. There is also a 1,800-cubic-foot fish hold.

Cost of the vessel, complete with scientific equipment, was nearly \$1,750,000.

The ship was built along with trawler lines, diesel-powered and with the hull strengthened for navigation in ice. Since trips of six to eight weeks will be required at times, provision has been made for a cruising range of 7,500 miles without refueling.

DESIGN PLANS CHANGED
The vessel was originally designed by Graham and Woolnough of Liverpool, England, but was finally built to design plans and specifications prepared by Montreal naval architects, Milne, Gilmore and German, to meet requirements of the research board.

The main hull is of steel and the superstructure of aluminum. Navigational and scientific survey equipment will include the latest radar, depth-sounding and other electronic devices.

Two radar sets will be provided for long, intermediate and short-range protection, enabling use of one set for survey operations and the other, at the same time, for safe navigation.

Find Body Of Missing Boy Floating In River

JOLIETTE, Que. (CP)—A body found Sunday floating on the Assomption river near St. Come has been identified as that of Andrew Brown, 11, who disappeared in and rugged Laurentian bushland May 19.

His disappearance caused a massive search led by the army. About 130 army men, together with provincial police and volunteers, probed the dense forest area around St. Come during the last week. The army called off its search Thursday night, but volunteers continued to hunt.

Sunday, before noon, a group of searchers led by Gerard Lamarche, 55, spotted the body floating on the river six miles from St. Come, a small community 15 miles north of here and 65 miles north of Montreal.

The search in past days had been hampered by heavy rain squalls and winds.

The RCMP pressed into service May 21 a dog flown to the St. Come area from Moncton, N.B. The dog was later withdrawn.

All the leads failed to turn up any sign of the boy and late last week searchers were given up and returning to their homes.

Andrew's father, Walter, returned to Verdun and his job in Montreal after a week of tramping through the forest.

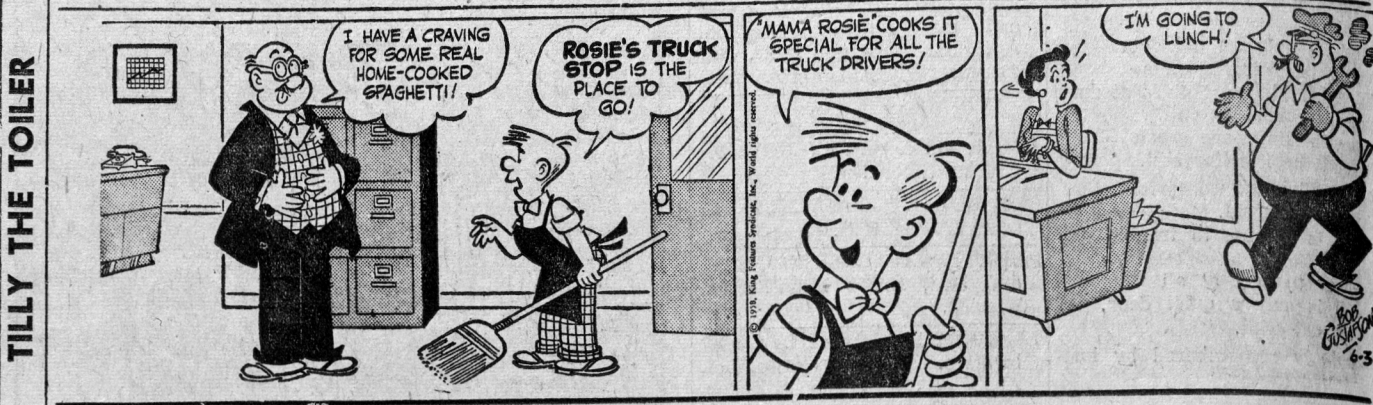

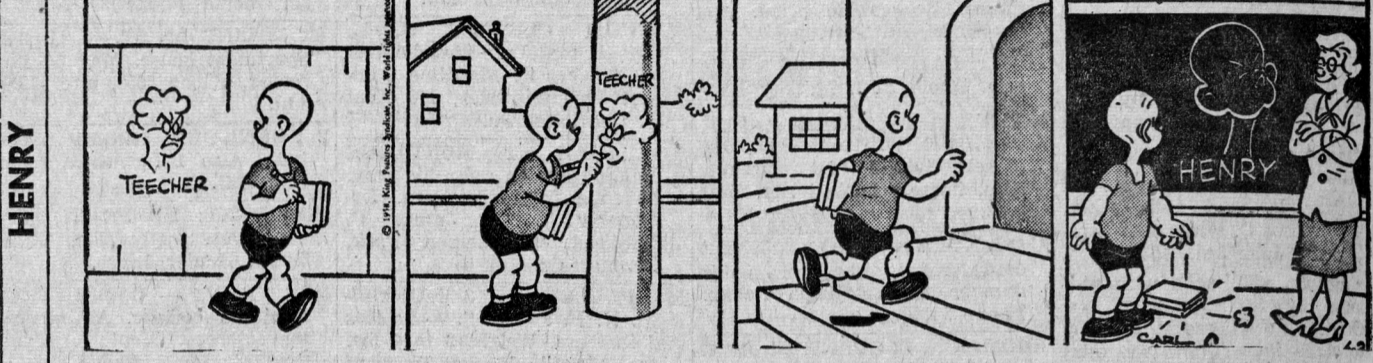


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
