The angel of death claimed as its own the soul of Miss Bessie Stewart, 297 Fitzroy Street, City, on Jan. 30, 1951.

Miss Stewart was in failing health for several years, the last being confined to bed. A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Stewart, she was born at Cross Roads and was the last surviving member of a family of nine.

After graduating from Prince of Wales College she taught school for several years before going to U. S. A. There she diligently studied and achieved diplomas in bookkeeping from Y. W. C. A., Boston, Mass., Stenographic, Boston Commercial College, post graduate diplomas from State Normal School, Salem, Mass., and Carnegie College, Rogers, Ohio. She continued her teaching career in several schools in New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

After three years Miss Stewart returned to her native province to care for an invalid sister, and following her death continued house-keeping for her brother, the late Mr. Duncan Stewart, Cross Roads. In 1937 she moved to Charlottetown with Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Brittain who have tenderly cared for her in her declining years.

In religion a devout member of Anglican Church and a faithful attendant while health permitted. The funeral was held from the MacLean Funeral Home on Friday, February 2nd. Friends throughout the Province were shocked and saddened to learn of the death in the P. E. I. Hospital on February 7th of Walter Wakelin at the age of 48 years. Although in ill health for the past several months he performed his daily tasks efficiently and cheerfully, until the latter part of November when he was advised by his doctor to take a rest. His condition gradually became worse and on December 17th he entered the P. E. I. Hospital for treatment, where it was found necessary to perform a major operation, which operation was performed on January 8th at the Provincial Sanatorium. He recovered sufficiently to be removed to the P. E. I. Hospital, where he patiently and uncomplainingly bore his suffering, and where no means were spared by the medical and nursing staffs to alleviate his pain, until on the above mentioned date he quietly passed away.

Walter was widely and favorably known throughout the Province, having operated a garage prior to his employment as City mechanic.

MAJOR OLIVE HISCOTT

On Feb. 28th in the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Major Olive Hiscott passed peacefully into the presence of the Saviour whom she had served so faithfully for many years.

For more than 25 years, Major Hiscott had served as a Field Officer in the ranks of the Salvation Army, commanding many corps in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Her work was highly praised by those in authority and many people remember her with deep gratitude for the spiritual and material help she so freely administered.

Her last command was in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, from which she entered into honorable retirement. For the last few months she lived with her sister at Breadalbane and, while far from well, her sudden severe illness and death was a shock to all.

During the short service in the home of her brother, James Hiscott, Major and Mrs. Hutchinson sang the favorite hymn of the departed, "The Old Rugged Cross" and later during the service in the church sang, "The Christians Goodnight."

The Major spoke of the qualifications required to enter into the rest prepared for God's people and assured all present, if they followed the path of duty as faithfully as the deceased had done during the years of her earthly pilgrimage, there was no doubt but that all would be accepted by God. Prayer was offered by Reverend Green.

After the church service the remains were taken to the cemetery at Cavendish where the committal service was read by Major Hutchinson, who was assisted by Rev. Gough. The service was deeply impressive as the friends and mourners sang around the open grave, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye."
