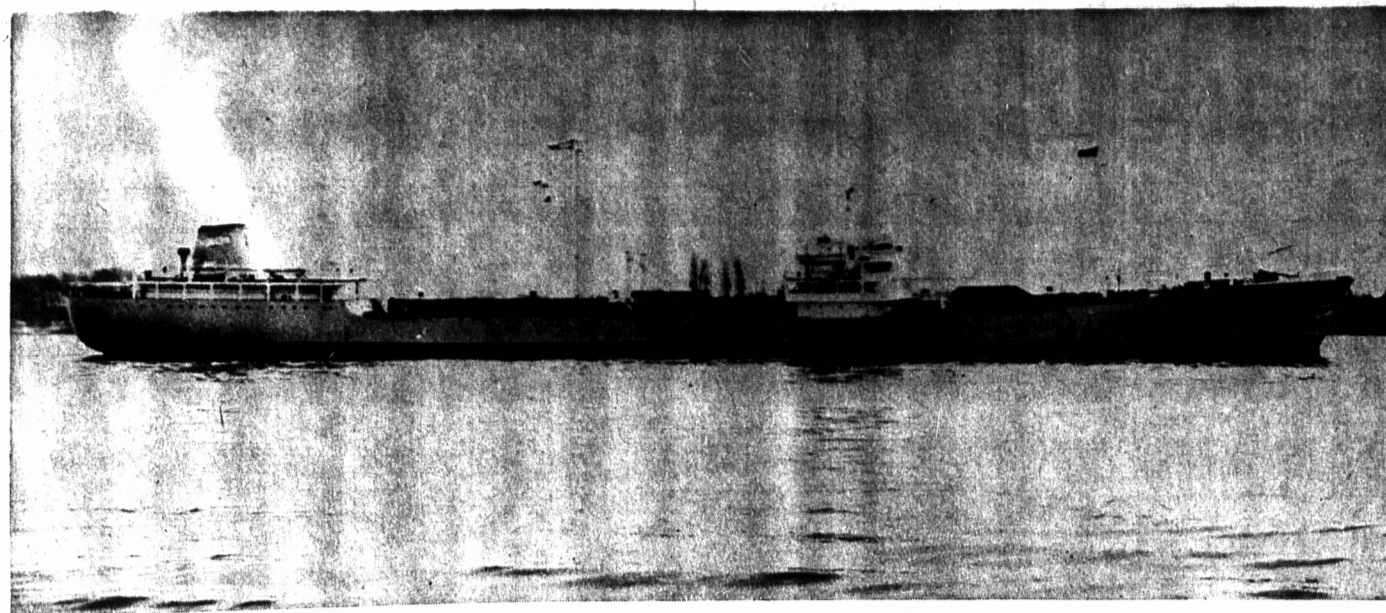

HUGE TANKER EXPECTED HERE ON MONDAY

What is believed to be the biggest merchant ship ever to enter Charlottetown harbour will arrive on Monday. This ship, the modern diesel driven 18,000-ton tanker "Irvingbrook", flagship of the Irving Oil Co. fleet, is employed on the West Indies run. She is enroute from Aruba in the Dutch West Indies, carrying a mixed cargo of petroleum products. To enable the ship to secure alongside without danger of clogging the circulation intakes, owing to the insufficient depth of water close to the wharf, a second tanker the "Irvinglake" will be secured between the "Irvingbrook" and the wharf. In addition, to prevent her resting on the bottom as the tide drops, a third tanker the "Seekonk" will secure on the outside to take part of the cargo. The pilot having the honour of bringing this large vessel into the harbour is Wallace MacDonald of Charlottetown. With the arrival of the huge

Navy To Play Host To Children At Big Party

The final arrangements for the annual children's party, to be held at HMCS Queen Charlotte on the afternoon of Dec. 22, are rapidly nearing completion. It is estimated that one hundred and twenty children will be entertained, with each receiving gifts and refreshments. The man of the year as far as the kiddies are concerned, Santa Claus, will certainly be taken care of. From then on the training programme will be intensified to ensure that everyone will complete the required training before the end of the current training season. The Sunday evening showing of films will also be closed down from Dec. 18th to Jan. 8th.

Local First Aid Committee Meets

Dr. A. J. Marchison presided at a recent meeting of the Red Cross First Aid Services held at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown. The committee members expressed satisfaction with the progress report which showed that over 500 men and women are presently enrolled in standard first aid courses throughout the Province. 25 standard first aid classes have been completed earlier this year and 259 candidates issued standard first aid certificates. 293 persons have received free first aid treatment for injuries by the volunteer workers who staff the 40 first aid posts. The committee approved the plans for the annual first aid school at Red Cross headquarters during the last week of December. This school will provide first aid instruction on three different levels: A-Standard course, especially for school teachers and those interested in first aid posts; B-Instructors course; C-Instructors refresher course. The Red Cross offers this training to residents in any part of the Province—free of charge.

Recipient of Drama Award

The governing committee of the Canadian Drama Award has named Mr. John Alexander Lawson, Euston St., Charlottetown one of seven persons in Canada to win a Canadian Drama Award for 1955. He will be the recipient of a suitable scroll and gold pin for his meritorious service in drama. Mr. Lawson who is acting-branch manager here of the Canadian Farm Loan Board, has been an enthusiastic member of the Little Theatre Guild for more than twenty years. He has been its president for several terms and has served the Guild in practically every department. At present he is chairman of the P. E. I. Regional Committee of the Dominion Drama Festival.

Diverted To Local Port

A cargo ship, the Mexico, originally bound for Summerside from Baltimore with a 1,500-ton cargo for Canada Packers Ltd., has been diverted to Charlottetown where her cargo has been purchased by the Island Fertilizers Inc. The change in plans was caused by engine trouble en route, thus causing a delay in her arrival; and the captain declined to risk his ship through the heavy ice in Summerside Harbour. The vessel, which is of Liberian registry, secured a berth at the Marine wharf last evening, and while here she will complete the necessary engine repairs.

Rail Freight Traffic From Province Up

The following information on the movement of freight cars to and from the Province was released yesterday by the Canadian National Railways, Island Division. The report showed a substantial increase in freight traffic from Borden to Tormentine, and a slight decline coming in to Borden. The total outgoing was 2061 carloads and incoming 1236 as compared to the corresponding period in 1954 which showed 1709 outgoing and 1335 incoming.
