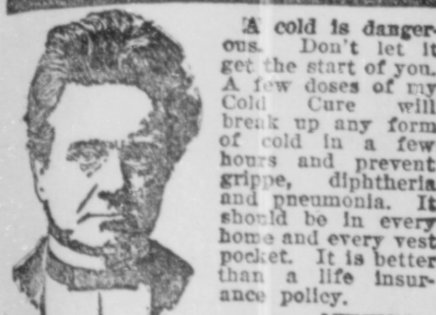

UGLY NEWS FROM CONGO

Telegraph Expedition Had a Fierce Battle With Cannibals

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Advices from the Congo announce that Captain Mohun, formerly United States consul at Zanzibar who is commanding the Belgian Tanganyika-Congo telegraph expedition, has reached the Congo Free State and was engaged, at the end of July, in a fierce battle at Tanguli, where the force consisted of ten Europeans, with Captain Mohun commanding. Shortly after the attack commenced Baron Dhamis, the Belgian commander, despatched three companies of soldiers to assist Mohun, and the enemy consisting of cannibals, who horribly torture their wounded, were finally routed.

Captain Mohun did great execution with a Winchester repeater. It is estimated that the enemy numbered 1500 men and lost 300 killed and 60 wounded. The Belgian force lost nine men killed and 47 wounded. The enemy fled to Tanganyika.

AN UNLAWFUL CONCESSION.

The Ottawa Government has violated the law in order to give American vessels the advantage and profit of the coasting trade of Canada.

According to the Act respecting the coasting trade:

"No goods or passengers shall be carried by water from one part of Canada to another except in British ships."

Foreign vessels carrying goods or passengers from one Canadian port to another are liable to a fine, and the goods "shall be forfeited."

The law proceeds to provide:

"The Governor-in-Council may from time to time declare that the foregoing provisions of this act shall not apply to the ships or vessels of any foreign country in which British ships are admitted to the coasting trade of such country."

So that our Government can admit American ships to our trade if the United States admits Canadian ships to the American coasting trade, and not otherwise.

The Government has taken the law into its own hands for the benefit of American ship owners who give us no reciprocal return.

What secret underlies this grant of a valuable concession to favoured American ship owners?—Mail and Empire.

Buller's Army.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Apparently extensive preparations are in progress at De Aar Junction, Cape Colony, for the concentration of Lieut. Gen. Buller's army. Thousands of mules are corralled in that neighborhood and transport material is being hurried up from the south.

NEWS NOTES.

Eleven nephews of the Duke of Abercorn are going to the front with the British troops in South Africa.

An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Herald intimates that Parliament may be called to meet to authorise the sending of a second regiment to South Africa.

Mass was celebrated by Rev. Gregory McDonald, and the Bishop took the other services. In the sanctuary were Rev. R. B. McDonald, Rustico, Rev. Donald McDonald, Tignish, and Rev. J. Angus McDonald, Hope River. The pallbearers were: Hon. A. McMillan, Judge McLeod, R. T. Holman, P. T. Fanning, Chas. Murphy, G. H. McDonald.

ENGLAND'S COAL.—Is estimated that at the beginning of the new century England will have 82,000,000 tons of coal still unused and available.

MANUAL TRAINING.—At a meeting of the public school board Thursday night at Ottawa, Professor Robertson presented a scheme for the establishment of a manual training school at the capital. Others will be established throughout the country. The schools are to be carried on by private subscription, the necessary capital being deposited by Sir William C. McDonald in the bank. Ottawa will be the headquarters of the system. Brockville will be the Ontario centre. The other provincial centres will be Montreal, Fredericton, Truro, Charlottetown, Winnipeg or Brandon, Calgary and Victoria or Vancouver.

SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—On Thursday afternoon last while Percy Bowness, of Summerside, and some of his companions were playing with a small rifle, the weapon was accidentally discharged, and the bullet passed completely through Percy's right thigh. The boy in whose hands the rifle was at the time, stuck to him—while the others skipped out—and together they started for the doctor's. Mrs. Bowness, who was on her way home, met them, and noticing something was wrong, found out what was the matter, and took Percy home and sent for a doctor, who dressed the wound, and the lad is now doing all right.—Agriculturist.

A ROMANCE OF THE DAY.—An amusing episode in connection with the enlistment of the South African contingent, has come to light. Two Ottawa brothers were equally ardent in their desire for active service, but one was over 22, the necessary age, while the other was not. The eligible candidate passed the medical examination and was accepted. The younger brother was broken-hearted over his failure to qualify in point of age. It happened, however, that the successful candidate was unable to accompany the contingent when they left. He wired Col. Otter asking if he could get a place if he went to Quebec. The answer in the affirmative was intercepted by the young would-be warrior, who sold his bicycle for \$60, took the train for Quebec and joined the contingent under his brother's name. How the matter is to be straightened out is what is now puzzling the family of the two heroic youths.

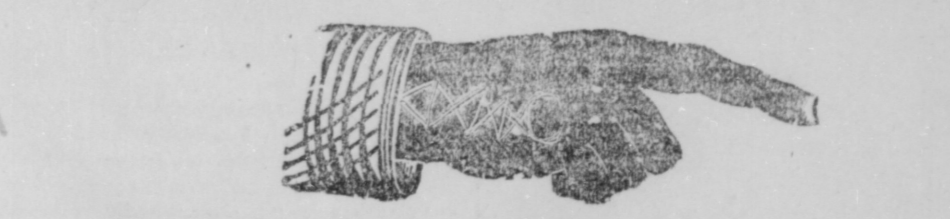
