3,000,000 Fords Made in Canada

OAKVILLE, Ont. (CP) — The Ford Motor Company of Canada Wednesday turned out its 3,000,000th vehicle since the company produced Canada's first automobile 50 years ago.

Assembly lines at the giant plant here paused for a simple ceremony as the car rolled off. At the wheel was Rhys M. Sale, company president.

It took the company 27 years to make its first 1,000,000 vehicles, 14 years for the second 1,000,000, and only eight years for the third. The first 1,000,000 were completed by 1932, the second by 1946.

Plan \$100 Licence Fee For Horses

MONTREAL (CP) — It looks as if Old Dobbin may take the unkindest cut of all from suburban Outremont.

Outremont city council voted to levy a \$100 licence fee—instead of the current \$5 tariff—on horses used for business purposes, it was learned Wednesday. No reason was given for the big jump.

Three aldermen voted for it, two against and three refrained from voting. The by-law not yet effective—is in the hands of a lawyer for study.

WINNIPEG (CP) — All oats, barley and rye prices scored seasonal highs Wednesday in early trading on the Winnipeg grain exchange but some of the advances were reduced later.

A good commercial demand in oats and barley included sizeable export interest. Overseas business to the continent was indicated in both commodities.

No information was available on overnight export loadings of Canadian wheat but Israel was reported to have taken two cargoes and Holland one.

Lakehead prices for top grades of Class Two, IWA and domestic wheat were down one-eighth cent, except for class two durum which were unchanged.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market clung to the upside by a slim margin Wednesday despite profit-taking.

The profit-taking was not unexpected. In the previous four sessions the market had advanced sharply, sending selected issues up a half-dozen points or so.

Actually, the Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed at \$13.90. And there were 44 highs for the year against only four lows.

The industrial average showed an advance of 20 cents. The rail average was down 20 cents while the utility average was off 10 cents.

The market was higher from the start and aircraft moved quickly to gains of a point or two. As the session progressed, firmness was noted in selected oils, chemicals and motion pictures. As profit-taking became more intense, however, aircraft gains disappeared and most of the leaders closed unchanged.

Canadian stocks were mixed. Dome Mines dropped 5-8 and Canadian Pacific and International Nickel fell 1-8. Hiram Walker advanced 1-2 and Distillers Seagrams was ahead 1-4.

Lake Shore, Canadian Issue on the American stock exchange, eased 1-4.

MONTREAL (CP) — Stock market prices gained strength irregularly in quiet trading Wednesday.

General Industrials and Algoma Steel were up 1-3/4 points to 70 and 42-3/4, respectively. International Paper advanced 1/2 point to 78 and Seagrams at 32 1-4 was 5-8 better.

Half-point gains were made by Canada Cement, Consolidated Smelters, Imperial Oil and Corby "A".

Other higher issues were Traders' Finance "A", Dominion Bridge, Brown, Shawinigan, International Nickel, B.A. Oil and National Steel.

Vickers lost a point at \$1 while Foundation at 20 and Canadian Industries at 24 were 3-4 weaker.

Canadian Breweries eased 5-8 to 25. Canadian Car posted a 1-2-point dip at 23 1-2 while Asbestos Corporation, Walker, Aluminum and Doco were down minor fractions.

Papers, utilities, senior metals and senior oils leaned forward. Carriers generally held firm.

A narrowly mixed tone ruled the mine section. Labrador was off 80 cents at \$8.95. Giant Yellowknife moved up 30 at \$8.50. Western oils were trendless.

Industrial volume was 55,100 shares and mines 347,800.

The stock exchange's closing averages show banks unchanged at 44-1/4, utilities up 0-2 at 113-6, industrials off 0-1 at 216-5, combined unchanged at 182-2, papers up 1-1/4 at 108-45 and golds up 0-13 at 64-38.
