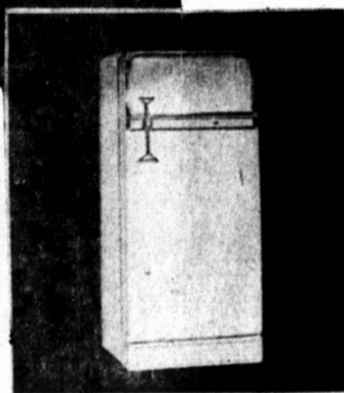

Annual Meeting Of Tryon United Baptist Church

The annual meeting of the Tryon United Baptist Church was held in the church hall, Wednesday evening, Feb. 27th. Before the meeting, the families of the congregation enjoyed supper and a social hour.

The pastor Rev. Lindsay Graves, opened the meeting with scriptures, reading and prayer, after which the annual business meeting convened with Rev. Graves as chairman.

Mr. Brenton C. Wood, church clerk, read the minutes of the last annual meeting and Mr. Arthur Simmons, church treasurer, read the financial report. Following these, the chairmen of all church organizations, gave their reports.

Mr. Eric Robinson, chairman of the board of trustees, reported the redecorating of the interior of the hall, the parsonage, and the Westmoreland church, the grading of the Tryon church lawn, some necessary repairs on the property, and the installation of a new pump in the parsonage.

Mrs. Raymond Wood read the report of the Tryon Women's Missionary Society and the Young People's Society. Mrs. Robert Mayhew reported the Westmoreland W.M.S. These groups recorded an increase both in membership and usefulness. The Sunday School report was given by Miss Millie R. Gamble.

The Guild report by Mrs. Spurgeon Clark, Mrs. Claude Vessey reported for the sewing circle, Mrs. Kenneth Roblee for the mission Band, and Mrs. L. Graves for the C.G. I.T. group. All these reports revealed that 1946 had been a successful year spiritually and financially.

The report of the church hall committee was given by Mr. Keith Thomas.

Following these reports, Rev. L. Graves, made a few remarks. He said that as he has only succeeded the former minister, Dr. E. J. Barrass, on the first of December, he could only report for one month in 1956, but that he had made pastoral calls and had become acquainted with the members of his congregation, and had conducted all the regular services of the church. He expressed his appreciation for the welcome extended to him and his family, and his gratification at the co-operation of his new congregation.

The church clerk reported that eleven members were baptised into the church during 1956, that ten members were given letters to other churches, and that deaths had removed five from the church-roll, making the total membership 156 resident members, and 56 non-resident members.

Kenneth Robblee, Lloyd Rogerson, Kenneth Painter, Dean Johnson, George Wood, Arnold Howatt and Arthur Large.

After the business was completed, a moment of silence was observed in memory of those who had gone to their reward during the year. The meeting closed with the singing of "Best of the Tie that Binds," and the pronouncement of the benediction by the pastor.

Mr. and Mrs. Francis MacDonald were recent visitors to Emvale.

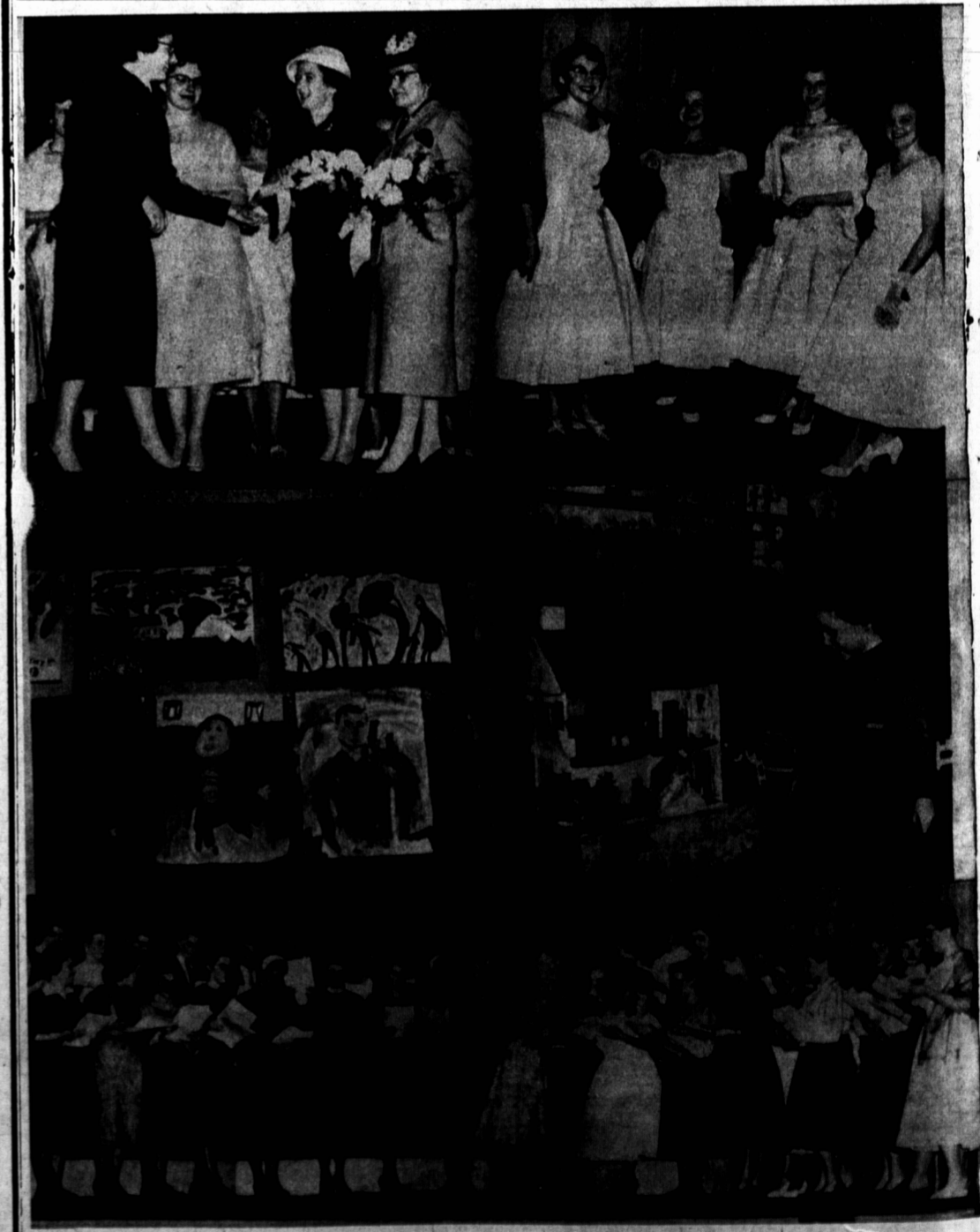
