

The Firemen's Celebration.

The Firemen's Procession, as we predicted Tuesday, was a grand success. Too much praise cannot be accorded Chief Engineer Large and the Captains of the different Companies, who managed the affair.

The procession, as we announced, formed on Grafton Street, and paraded the streets mentioned in our last issue. It was headed by the Band of the 82nd Battalion, driven in a four horse team of Mr. Worth's "Tremont" Engine led. It was gaily decorated with evergreens and artificial flowers, and bore the motto:

"NEVER DESPAIR: WE ARE COMING."

in flaming letters, and her name, "Tremont No. 12," showed out in good style on a well printed transparency. With a good-looking company to follow, numerous Chinese lanterns, colored lamps, etc., "Tremont" appeared well fitted to lead. The Hook and Ladder wagon presented a brilliant appearance. It was rendered attractive by a well executed transparent scene of a burning building with firemen at work. On the sides were two mottoes, "Where duty calls our willing feet shall tread to bring relief alike to foe and friend," and "Wakeup we list, the warning note to sound; then up and off, and soon on the ground." Along both sides of the carriage was the significant phrase,

"ALWAYS READY TO RESCUE."

Mr. Peter Ferguson, bagpiper, occupied a seat on the carriage, and discoursed sweet music. The carriage was beautifully festooned with evergreens and flowers, and was lighted with lanterns, etc. The Hook-and-Ladder Company, under Capt. White, followed, bearing torches. Rollo Engine came next, having in tow a miniature house burning brightly. She was splendidly decorated with flowers and evergreens. On her tank sat a transparency with the phrase "We risk our lives our friends to save," and

The hose-cart of the Rollo which followed, presented a gay appearance. It was handsomely decorated with spruce and rosettes, and flowers, and was occupied by two young firemen dressed in neat uniform. Rollo company, under command of Capt. Wagonet, presented a fine appearance. Silby engine brought up the rear. She was magnificently decorated. The suction hose which encircled her was covered with stars and stripes, the smoke stack was festooned with artificial flowers, and the body of the engine was adorned with showy bouquets, colored lanterns, etc. The reel was, perhaps, the greatest attraction of the procession. It was formed into one gigantic transparency with arches showing the interior. It bore the mottoes "Ever ready when duty calls" on one side, and

on the other. It was artistically trimmed with flowers, and lighted with lamps. It was occupied by three young firemen in uniform, and altogether presented a grand appearance. The company, under Capt. Hickey, formed a good-looking part of the procession.

The procession was marshalled by the Chief Engineer and Captain Beer, who were dressed in gorgeous uniforms, and drove a team appropriately decorated.

The promoters of the magnificent display are to be congratulated on the success with which it was crowned.

The Lonsdale Libel.

REMARKS OF LORD COLERIDGE IN SENTENCING EDMUND YATES.

Lord Chief Justice Coleridge badly betrayed himself on the 4th inst while sentencing Edmund Yates for libel. When the World published the statement concerning a rumored elopement of "a lady of very high rank and noble birth, with a young peer whose life was ill," it published the story distinctly as a rumor in circulation among sporting circles. There was no attempt in the paragraph to go into details, to indicate the identity of the guilty persons, or to show that Mr. Yates knew it. The story published was a fair chronicle of an actual rumor. The real harm was done subsequently when Mr. Yates particularized and intensified the scandal by editorially declaring that the publication had no reference to Lord Lonsdale. His Lordships advisers interpreted this contrariwise, and insisted that it was an attempt to apologise for an intended libel. The prosecution for criminal libel was then begun.

In view of all the circumstances of the case, it was generally believed that a mere conviction and a light fine, would have answered all the claims of Justice and satisfied the plaintiff. But the conviction was reached at an inopportune time for the defendant and before an aggrieved Court. Lord Coleridge, himself still smarting with resentment against society journals because of their liberal use of his name in connection with that of Mary Anderson, was in no mood to deal lightly with the World's offense. He denounced society journals as social pests and scathingly described the authors as persons who, unable to succeed in legitimate methods of journalism, had recourse for professional existence to the business of Paul Pry; nosing into the private affairs of decent people, becoming gossip-hunters and scandalmongers. His remarks were very bitter and injudiciously vindictive. He spoke with apparent relish when he sentenced Mr. Yates to four months imprisonment. It is doubtful if Mr. Yates will be subjected to the indignity of actual imprisonment. He has already secured a stay of punishment pending decision on a technical appeal, and will no doubt succeed in securing at least a mitigation of the decree.

Why the Eyes Shine.

AN EXPLANATION OF THEIR LUMINOUS APPEARANCE -HOW THE LIGHT IS REFLECTED.

Place a child (because the pupil of children are large) and by preference a blonde, says the Popular Science Monthly, at a distance of ten or fifteen feet from a lamp, which is the only source of light in the room, and cause it to look at some object in the direction of the lamp, turning the eye you wish to look at slightly inward toward the nose. Now, put your own eye close behind the lamp flame, with a card between it and the flame. If you will then look close by the edge of the flame covered by the card into the eye of the child you will see, instead of a perfectly black pupil, a reddish yellow circle. If the eye happens to be hypermetropic you will be able to see the red reflex when your own eye is at some distance to one side of the flame. This is the true explanation of the luminous appearance of the eyes of some animals when they are in comparative obscurity. It is simply the light reflected from the bottom of their eyes, which is generally of a reddish tinge, on account of the red fluid in the vascular layer of the corid back of the semi-transparent retina, and not light that is generated there at all. The reflection is most apparent when the animal is in obscurity, but the observer must be in the light, and somewhat in the relative position indicated in the above described experiment; that is, the eye of the observer must be on the same line with the light and the observed eye. The eyes of nearly all animals are hypermetropic, most of them very highly so, so that they send out the rays of light which have entered them in a very diverging manner.
