## Less Self-Rule Unions Is Claimed Necessary

VANCOUVER (CP)—A wider interpretation and application of existing laws is needed in labor relations—not more legislation, a prominent Montreal labor lawyer said Thursday.

"The more restrictive the legislation in this field," Phil Cutler

said in a paper to a section meeting of the Canadian Bar Association, "the fewer the small autonomous or semi-autonomous local unions will become."

Mr. Cutler, legal adviser to the Queens Federation of Labor and a member of the national legal advisory board of the Canadian Labor Congress, delivered his paper before the CBA's labor relations section.

The paper was entitled "right to work laws" and concerned itself largely with the union shop and the closed shop in labor relations.

"Any attempt to ban outright the closed-shop contract would meet with the same resistance as an act to prohibit all sales of liquor," Mr. Cutler said.

THREE PROBLEMS  
Three main problems grew from the closed-shop agreement: 1. Unfair treatment of the employee who is obliged to join a union; 2. Refusal of membership although the employee is prepared to join; and 3. Constitutional and bylaw regulations that create difficulty for individuals who are members.

On the first, he said, if the

constitution is democratically accepted, the individual obliged to join can only seek relief if the constitution is not properly applied and in those cases he can seek relief before the courts.

On the second, an individual prepared to join the union should be deemed a member for the purpose of employment whether the union admits him or not. This concept had been applied by some courts in the United States, although it was not a written statute.

On the third problem, decisions of a union resulting in consequences outside the confines of the union, such as dismissal from employment, are subject to court review after the union appeal resources have been exhausted.

USEFUL ELSEWHERE  
He also suggested that the labor relations law of Quebec, which gives the certification only to the national or international union—might be usefully adopted elsewhere.

H. A. Hansen of Fredericton, chairman of the New Brunswick Labor Relations Board, said there are no court decisions that permit a labor relations board to refuse certification on grounds of constitutional requirements. If this concept was to be added to labor relations, it must be through legislation.

He suggested the section should prepare a motion requesting such legislation, but no resolutions were put forward Thursday.

Norman L. Mathews of Toronto, speaking from the floor, said the closed and union shop give unions great powers and the
