Talented Songstress Gets Variety Invite

Success comes in many forms — to Miss Maida Rogerson the past few weeks have brought two great honors — a scholarship at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and an invitation to entertain at the first Canadian Royal Variety Performance for Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip at Confederation Centre Theatre in Charlottetown, Oct. 4.

Islander by birth, singer by profession, Miss Rogerson stays within the boundaries of Prince Edward Island, at the Royal Variety Performance, to pay homage to the Island's world-renowned authors, Lucy Maude Montgomery, in a scene from her most popular book 'Anne of Green Gables.'

She began her singing career locally performing at both concerts and festivals. With encouraging results, she went on to get her B.A. in Music at Mount Allison University in New Brunswick, where she studied under Catherine Judah Daniel.

Next came frequent concert appearances in the Maritimes and Eastern Canada, topped off with the Halifax Rose Bowl and as the best singer in the Nova Scotia Provincial Festival.

In 1961 Miss Rogerson received a Canada Council grant to further her studies in Europe under the guidance of Maestro Luigi Ricci, of the Rome Opera, and Kiri Nurvela of the Freiburg Opera in Germany.

Basil Reginald MacIsaac and Wilfred Thomas Hughes, both of Charlottetown, appeared before Judge C. St. Clair Trainor in Queens County Court yesterday on charges of breaking and entering the Charlottetown Curling Club and committing an indictable offense of theft.

Sergeant John Hoday of the RCMP Crime Lab in Sackville, N.B. testified in both cases as to finding traces of fluorescent powder on certain articles of clothing and money turned over to him by Sergeant Charles Taylor and Sgt. Douglas Taylor of the Charlottetown City Police.

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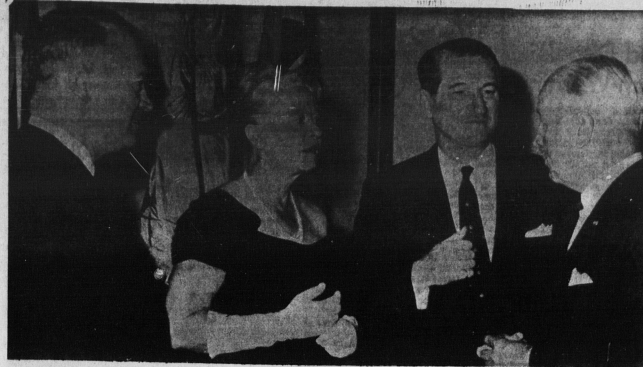
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A RECEPTION for Air Marshall Hugh Campbell, president of the Royal Canadian Air Force Association, Ottawa, was held at Confederation Centre

Ch'town Man Sentenced To Penitentiary

Victor Thomas Heminger of Charlottetown was sentenced to one year in Dorchester Penitentiary yesterday on a charge of possession of stolen goods when he appeared before Queens County Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. for sentencing. The sentence is run concurrent with a sentence handed down at an earlier session.

William Edward MacQuaid of Toronto was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days on a charge of dangerous driving and \$50 and costs or 30 days on a charge of driving while his license was suspended. His license to drive in Canada was suspended for three months also.

Keith Martin MacViddy of Victoria, B.C. was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days for driving while impaired.
