Remarkable Change In Sex Noted

LONDON, (Reuters)—a former RAF fighter pilot—father of two children—has changed completely

into an attractive, blonde woman. Doctors said Friday they believe it may be the most complete sex transformation in medical history.

Until 1961 the pilot was Bob Cowell, 32, son of Maj-Gen. Sir Ernest Cowell.

Now the ex-pilot is Roberta Elizabeth Cowell—"Betty" to her friends. Doctors said Cowell now is a sophisticated woman who has completely re-adjusted herself to her new life. She cannot, however, bear children.

At present, the doctors said, Cowell is "somewhere in France". They added that two features make the case more unusual than most sex changes. A change from male to female—much rarer than the reverse—has seldom, if ever, taken place so late in life.

Secondly, the doctors said they knew of no previous case where the change has occurred in a man

already the father of two children.

The marriage came to an end in 1962—a year after the transformation. Cowell's wife obtained a divorce on the grounds of desertion.

Friends said Cowell led what appeared to be a normal life as a child, taking part in sports.

During the Second World War he joined the army, later transferred to the air force where he became a flight lieutenant, flying fighters. He flew Spitfires and wartime comrades say that in air battles he was always calm and assured.

His plane was shot down over Germany and he spent six months as a prisoner of war.

Back in civilian life after the war, he started an engineering business and resumed car racing. In 1948 his physical condition

and mental outlook began to change.

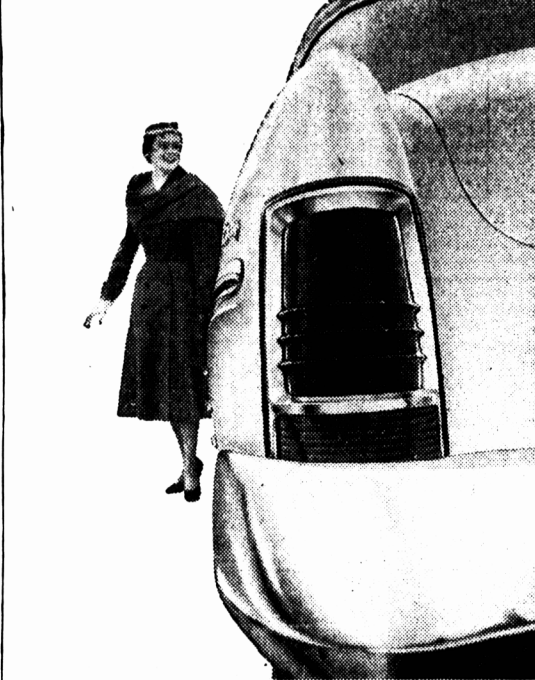
He consulted leading doctors who said his body showed prominent feminine characteristics which were developing at an unusually advanced age.

On the advice of doctors, he underwent hormone treatment to hasten the change. Plastic surgery

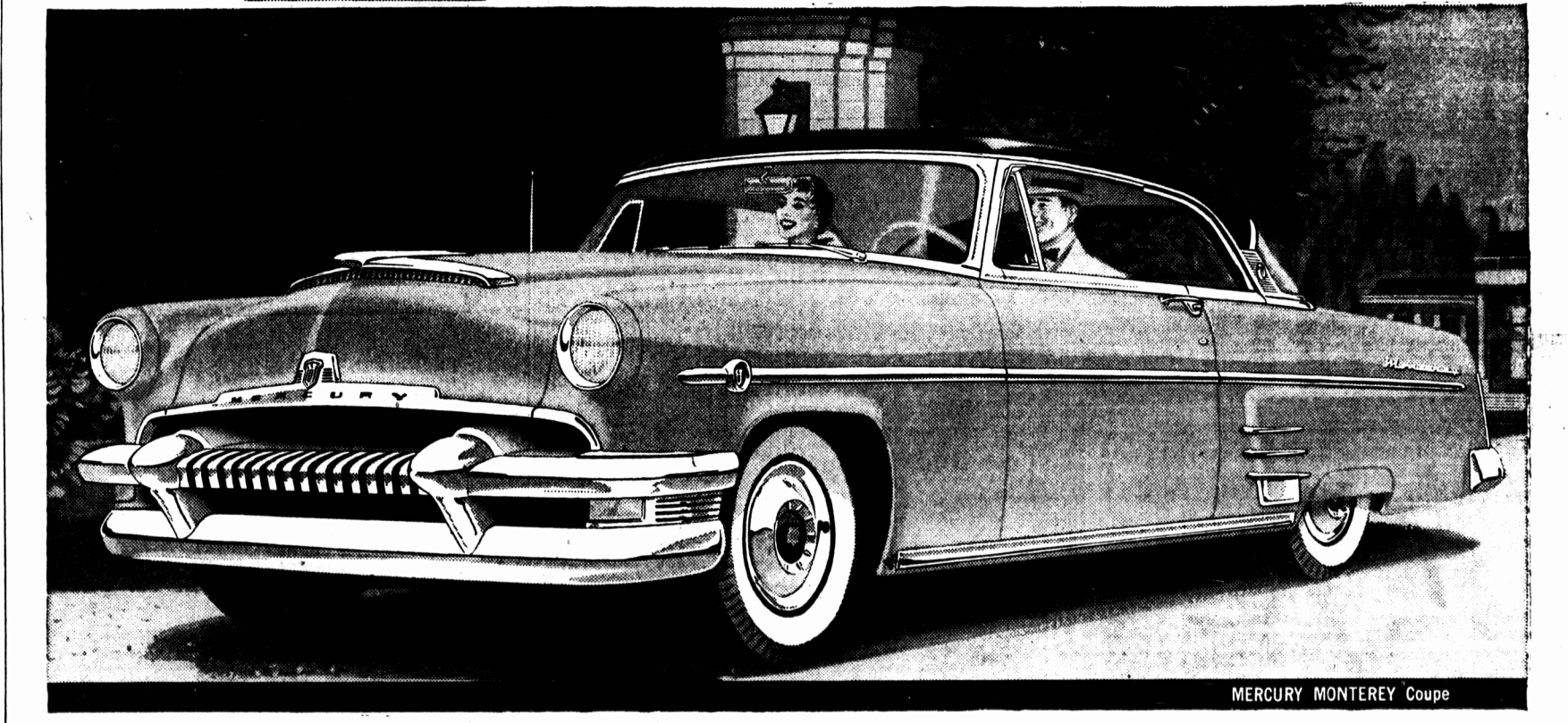
came next. A series of operations at a London hospital by an embryologist surgeon completed the transformation over the next three years.

A panel of doctors later examined Cowell and decided: "The patient is definitely not a man... She is undoubtedly a woman."
