First aircraft to fly in Canada, the Silver Dart is credited to Honorable J.A.D. McCurdy, one of two Canadian members of Dr. Alexander Graham Bell's Aerial Experiment Association. The first flight of the Silver Dart made in Canada at Baddeck, February 23, 1909, brought Hon. Mr. McCurdy the distinction of being the first British Subject to fly a heavier than air machine anywhere in the British Commonwealth. The replica, made at R.C.A.F. Trenton will be on view at the 1957 Canadian National Exhibition as part of the R.C.A.F.'s static display.

Research In Quadruple Vaccine Is Progressing

Canadian Press Staff Writer - EDMONTON (CP) - A major Canadian medical research development was revealed Wednesday in the announcement of a quadruple vaccine for polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough.

The vaccine—a combination of the Salk polio vaccine and the triple antigens now being injected together for the other three diseases—was developed at the Connaught Medical Research Laboratories in Toronto, and now is undergoing extensive tests.

No possible production or distribution date was included in the announcement before the Canadian Medical Association convention by laboratory consultant Dr. R. D. Defries.

Meanwhile, Dr. Bruce Chown of Winnipeg said in a discussion of the rh factor that about half the babies who normally would be born dead from this blood disease could be saved if delivered four to six weeks before the normal termination of pregnancy.

Dr. A. M. Bailey of Saskatoon said perfectionists who can't accept criticism without undue stress and prime subjects for headache and should practice moderation—smaller parties, fewer clubs, less responsibility.

Dr. Ernest James of Hamilton sketched the extensive field surgery often involved in non-penetrating injuries of the abdomen and referred to frequent late diagnosis of such injuries.

The scientific session will continue today and Friday, when the week-long convention ends.

In announcing the new quadruple vaccine, Dr. Defries said there is a current tendency for physicians to give only one series of inoculations. They omit either the triple vaccine against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, or omit the polio vaccine.
