New Method Of Teaching French In English Schools

OTTAWA (CP) — Public school children in five Ottawa classrooms will be guinea pigs this year for a new method of teaching French to English-speaking pupils. During the first stage of the course, for a period yet to be decided, they won't be asked to speak or write French. Instead they'll listen to French spoken by the teacher and from radio, movies and television. Later the teacher and pupils will carry on conversations, the teacher speaking French and the children answering in English. Still later the pupils will learn to read French. Not until the second stage, still later, will pupils be called on to learn to speak and write French through exercises similar to those now used by standard teaching methods.

FIRST CITY Ottawa is the first city to make the experiment. It is being carried out in grade 3 classes in two Roman Catholic separate schools and grade 5 classes in three public schools.

Unlike most other centres, this bilingual capital city starts French instruction at public school level in all schools, instead of at the high school level.

Dr. Robert Gauthier of Ottawa, Director of French Education for Ontario, says the main difference in the new method is that the pupil does not have to wrestle with the problem of expressing himself in French until he has become fairly familiar with the language and has stored up a number of common words and phrases in his memory.

The old method of teaching French to English-speaking Canadians, he said, has not been too successful in the past.

The age of 10 or 11 was the best time to start teaching a new language because by then most children were firmly established in their own tongue.

Public school pupils in the experiment will have four 20-minute periods a week and the separate school children five 15-minute periods.

New Mercurys To Be Shown

DETROIT, (AP)—The 1956 Mercury passenger cars, with new engines, new radiator grilles by Ford in the United States Sept. 29. Thirteen models will be produced in the Montclair, Monterey and custom series. There will be a new low-priced two-door sedan in the custom series, called the Medallist.

For standard and overdrive transmissions, Mercury will have an engine developing 210 horsepower. For automatic transmission an engine developing 225 horsepower is provided. All cars have 12-volt ignition systems.

Over-all height of all models has been reduced by lowering the roof line. More massive bumper guards and a new hood ornament have been added to the front end. New safety features include a new impact-absorbing steering wheel, with hub recessed six inches below the wheel rim; new door latches designed to keep doors closed in a crash and crash-resistant rear-view mirrors.
