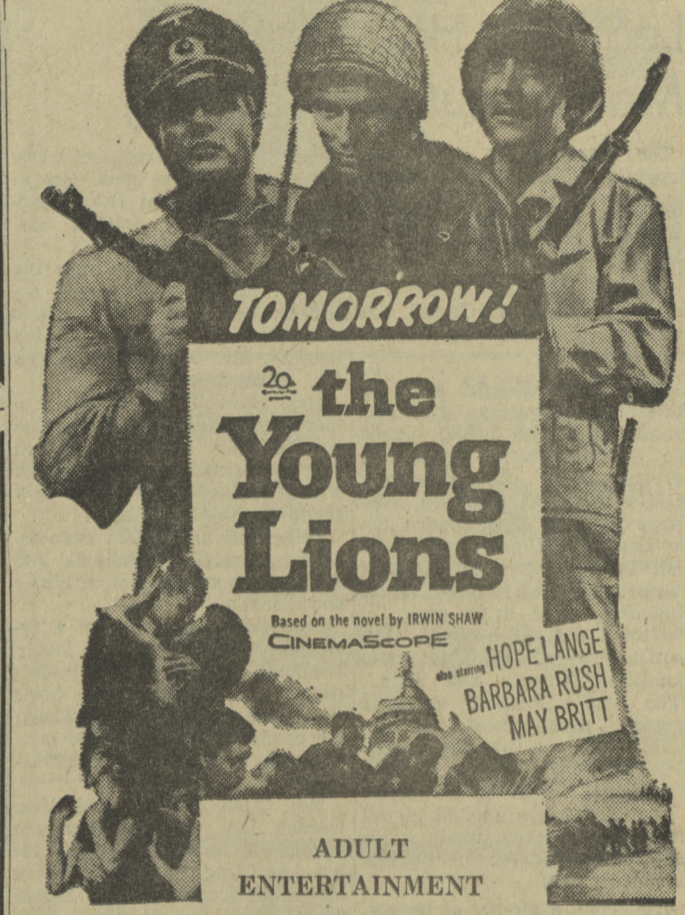

Canada Production to Triple by 1980 Living Standards to Rise Sharply

OTTAWA, Jan. 11 — No country in the world can look forward to a rosier future than Canada over the next quarter of a century. In a report, studied with hand-some prospects for a vast enhanced standard of living, Canadian enviro-

A look ahead to 1980 shows that Canada is expected to have: A population of 26,650,000. A work week of only 34.3 hours. A gross national product of \$76,000,000,000. Eighty per cent of the population living in urban areas. A nation that was a net exporter of capital. It might be that atomic energy would begin to appear on a commercial scale before 1970, with the most likely location being Southern Ontario. The labor force will grow at about the same rate as the population as a whole. The average hours per week in agriculture can be expected to drop from 55.3 to 43.75, and in business from 41.3 to 34.3 in 1980. At present, 62 per cent of the population is urban.
