The Carnegie people sent a cheque for \$75,000 for the purpose and the gift amounted to \$77,000 in all counting the exchange which prevailed at the time.

SOCIAL WELFARE. His service in the field of social welfare covers a great many phases of provincial life. Dr. MacMillan has always been a tireless champion of the Red Cross Society. He is the only surviving member of the P. E. I. Island division of the Canadian Red Cross Society of 1914 which in itself denotes 43 years of service. He was president of the Prince Edward Island Division for 10 years including the period of World War Two and resigned after working hard and effectively to get the free blood donor service established in this province.

But with all of his accomplishments he has been first of all a doctor. Often his nights were spent in vigil beside a sick bed; but he would be at his desk

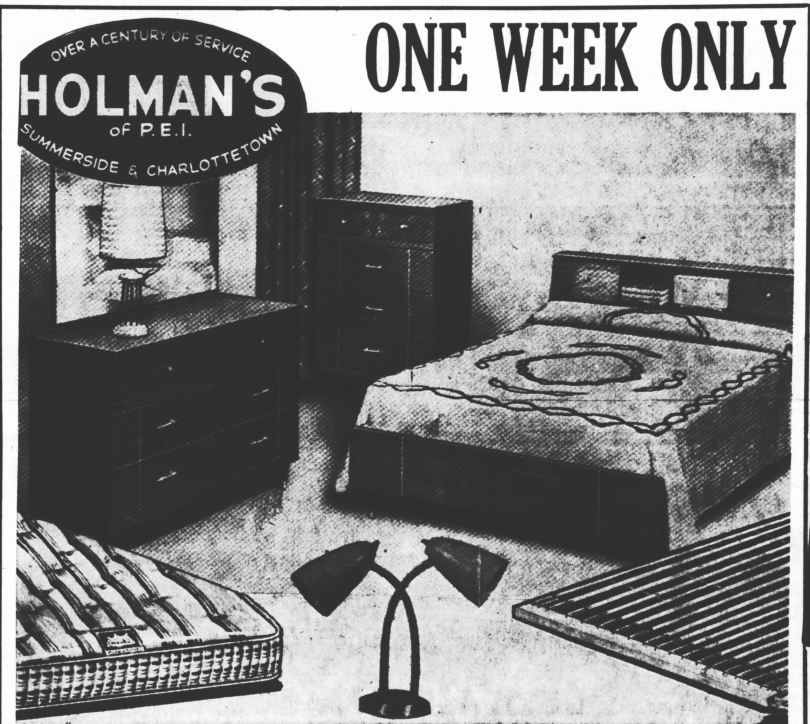
