### Leaving Scene Brings \$50 Fine

**SOURIS** — Henry Wilfred Carter of Souris was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days yesterday when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. here on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident.

Quentin Dennis Mossman of Souris elected trial by judge and jury on a break and entry charge. The case was adjourned to Oct. 6 for preliminary hearing.

Emmett Keefe of Morell Rear pleaded guilty to causing damage not exceeding \$50 and was fined \$35 and costs or 15 days. He was also ordered to make restitution of \$25.

Ivan Francis Keefe and Bernard Keefe, both of Morell Rear, were each fined \$35 and costs or 15 days for causing a disturbance.

### Fall Training Begins For Island's Militia

The fall training program for Island militia units has been mapped out by all three units involved, and training commenced last night at Charlottetown Army when officers and men of the Medical Company held their first parade.

The Prince Edward Island Regiment begins training here tonight when "A" Squadron holds its initial parade. "B" Squadron, with headquarters at Montague, will kick off tomorrow night. Training for "C" Squadron, with headquarters at Summerside, will start next week, with parades on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Training for 5 Signal Regiment will get underway here next Monday evening.

The amount of training time allotted to each unit remains about the same as it has been in recent years, and units will participate in corps training, for the most part. The only significant change in training for this year involves schedules for

courses that will be conducted within the units.

These courses will be concentrated so that they will be completed in one or two-week periods, and will involve training nightly and on weekends while they are in progress.

All three units will welcome many recruits as they can handle, and courses in recruit training have been laid on by all units. In addition, Lt. Col. E.G. MacLeod, M.C. officer commanding the P.E.I. Regiment, says his unit has a number of openings for prospective officer candidates — open to young men who have completed grade 12.

Candidates for these positions are asked to contact squadron commanders in their own areas — Major Ready, Charlottetown; Major Godfrey, Montague; or Major BeBernard, Summerside.

The P.E.I. Regiment has a day on the range set for mid-October, and the unit plans another overnight exercise at Camp Buchanan for early October.

5 Signal Regiment has openings for recruits, plus several openings for CWAC candidates. This unit plans courses for recruits, tradesmen, officer candidates, and CWAC recruits this fall. Parades are held on Monday evenings at the local armory. Officers in charge of training are: Major Pollard, wireless; Major Doyle, recruits; and Major Boswell, line communications.

5 Medical Company, training on Wednesday evenings, has openings for recruits and nursing sisters. This unit, under command of Lt. Col. A. L. Roberts, will offer courses for recruits and tradesmen.
