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## GROWERS ENDORSE ACTIONS OF P. E. I. POTATO BOARD

### Duke Of Edinburgh First Gentleman Of Realm

LONDON, Sept. 30.—(CP)—The Queen tonight declared that the Duke of Edinburgh will henceforth hold "precedence next to Her Majesty."  
Elevation of the Queen's husband to the number two position in the British realm—made by the Queen's warrant and announced in the official London Gazette—was seen as preliminary to making Philip prince consort. That is the title devised a century ago by Queen Victoria for her consort Albert. Philip is expected to get it before the Queen's coronation on June 2.

The Gazette said the Queen, by warrant dated Sept. 18, declares and ordains that the Duke "shall henceforth upon all occasions and in all meetings, except where otherwise provided by act of Parliament, have hold and enjoy a place of pre-eminence and precedence next to Her Majesty."  
Until now, the Duke of Windsor and the Duke of Gloucester, sons of King George V, took official precedence over the Duke of Edinburgh at all functions not attended by the Queen.

He was created Duke of Edinburgh, and given the title "His Highness" (Continued on Page 5 Col. 4)

### U. S. Takes Wraps Off Huge Gun Made To Shoot Atomic Shells

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The United States army has stripped the secrecy mantle from a huge gun made to shoot atomic shells at enemy troops on a battlefield 20 miles away.  
At the Aberdeen, Md., proving grounds the other day the army showed off two of the guns to visitors to:

1. Back up its year-old claim that it really has its own atomic weapons, just as the air force and the navy have planes to carry atomic bombs.  
2. Show that the 85-ton gun can travel highways, wheel off to travel cross-country to wherever an army division commander wants an atomic barrage put down, and then go into action within 20 minutes.

The visitors came away convinced that the atomic cannon now appears ready to join the other artillery of the army.  
Only a few experts can say whether it so far has fired an actual atomic shell. They decline to talk on that point.

Claim Advantages  
The army claims a number of advantages for the gun, including:  
It is dual-purpose, can shoot either conventional shells or atomic charges; its aim is four times more accurate at long range

### 1,200 Attend Meeting Last Night At P. W. C. Auditorium

A sweeping endorsement of the actions and orders of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board was registered last night at a public meeting of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture held in the Prince of Wales College Auditorium.  
It was one of the largest meetings of farmers ever held in this Province as estimates of the attendance ranged over the 1,200 mark. The Auditorium was jammed to the doors with people sitting around the floors and filling the aisles.

The large throng repeatedly applauded the remarks of Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the Board, when he was called on to answer the questions from the floor.  
Four Resolutions  
At the conclusion of the meeting the previously appointed Resolutions Committee brought in four resolutions for consideration by the meeting. The principal one stated that "Be it resolved by the potato growers present at this meeting, that the past record and action of the Potato Board be approved." Another of the resolutions authorized the Board to continue its efforts to create a fund to be expended for protection against disease and for general promotion of the industry by advertising, on the advice and with the approval of the Potato Promotional Committee. It was also decided by resolution that the potato growers accept the proposed licensing system until such time as legislation may be enacted regarding the collection of fees on the basis of volume sold. The meeting also went on record as stating that the Potato Board has "the confidence and support of this meeting."

In the fourth resolution presented to the committee stated: "Whereas, on February 14th, 1951, Board order No. 6, placing a levy of one cent (1c) per hundred on potatoes sold by growers, was passed and, whereas, it would appear that in a number of cases this levy was deducted by dealers from growers' returns and has not been paid to the Potato Board. Therefore, be it resolved, by this meeting, that such levies be immediately paid to the Board or refunded to the growers involved, and further, be it resolved, that if necessary the Attorney General of the Province be requested to facilitate legal action in this respect."

Resolution Tabled  
Another resolution presented from the floor that the Government be asked to hold a plebiscite to determine the future of the Board was tabled for one year.

At the start of the meeting Mr. Charles Yeo, president of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture, told the gathering that the meeting was not called to "tell you what you should do. We are asking what you want done." He asked that order and decorum be maintained throughout the meeting, and it was noticeable that such was the case all evening.

Principal speaker of the night was Dr. H. H. Hannam, president of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, whose talk appears elsewhere in today's issue.  
One of the potent statements to emerge from the meeting was that of Mr. MacDonald when he said, "You can vote away your Board tonight, but Ladies and Gentlemen, (Continued on Page 10 Col. 4)

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### Callow Undergoes Major Operation

HALIFAX, Sept. 30.—(CP)—Blind and paralysed Walter Callow succeeded in pulling through a major operation today which saw both legs amputated above his knees.  
The 38-year-old First World War veteran, who wants Canada's wheelchair patients to enjoy a life that he has known.  
He was reported as "resting comfortably" in Camp Hill Military Hospital after the operation.  
Doctors were "reasonably optimistic" about his chances for a healthy recovery.  
Callow can barely move his lips, result of a creeping paralysis which started 20 years ago following a war-time plane crash. But like today—his courage and indomitable spirit spurred him beyond his early ambition to become a mechanical expert.  
From his bed, he dictated plans for a specially-designed bus to permit wheelchair patients to make trips to the country, sporting events and picnics.  
His three buses last year took out every wheelchair patient in the Maritime Provinces. Callow, who hopes some day to have 150 such vehicles, has never seen or been in his invention.

### Reports Plan To Speed Up Defence Preparations

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—(CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson indicated today that Western countries will be asked to accelerate their defence preparations in 1953.  
Outlining to a press conference some of the impressions gained during a recent trip to Europe, Mr. Pearson said that members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization will "have to do more in 1953 than in 1952."  
He did not elaborate, but said one of N. A. T. O.'s first duties in 1953 will be to complete this year's defence program. The 14-member organization will fall somewhat short of its 1952 objective to have 50 armed divisions available—25 on active service and 25 in immediate reserve.

### New Process In Motion Pictures Seen In N. Y.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Perhaps the experience will recall the first time you swooped down in a fair grounds roller coaster. Or when, on a first airplane flight, the pilot suddenly went into a side slip.  
Those first sensations, combined with the scenic effects of a motion picture production, are the combination of cinerama, a three-dimensional film process which made its formal bow to Broadway audiences tonight at the New York City.  
The cinerama film, as seen now, is something bordering on a travelogue. But its first showing points the way towards possible technical changes in the entertainment world.  
The film is entitled "This Is Cinerama" because it is, in fact, the introduction of a new motion picture process. It is not yet a film with a plot. The Grand Canyon of the Colorado River in Arizona, the Cypress Gardens of Florida and the triumphal scene of "Aida" at La Scala Grand Opera in Milan are the themes for this new full-dimensional sight picture at the Broadway Theatre.  
The cinerama film requires a cylindrical screen about six times the normal size of the usual movie screen. The overall screen is 63 feet across the top

### Author of Social Credit Plan Dies

PEARLAN, Perthshire, Scotland, Sept. 30.—(Reuters)—Clifford Hugh Douglas, 73, author of the social credit plan to run public finance, died at his home here yesterday, it was announced tonight.

Douglas was chief reconstruction adviser for the Government of Alberta in 1935 and was a witness for the Canadian banking enquiry in 1923.  
Educated at Pembroke College, Cambridge, he was the author of "The Alberta Experiment" among other publications.  
During his career Douglas was chief engineer and manager in India for the British Westinghouse Co. Ltd.; assistant superintendent of Royal Aircraft Factory; and a major in the Royal Flying Corps and the R. A. F.

### Will Call Gen. Smith To Explain Reds Reference

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The House of Representatives Un-American Activities Committee decided today to call Gen. Walter Bedell Smith for testimony on his testimony on Communist infiltration in government agencies.  
The announcement came just after Smith, chief of the secret Central Intelligence Agency, had backed a step further away from the Smith testimony, said: "Gen. Smith's shocking revelation is only further evidence that our national safety is endangered by the incredible looseness with which our security and loyalty programs have been handled during the last 20 years."  
Meanwhile, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential candidate, was reported working the Smith testimony into speech material for his midwestern whistle stop tour starting tomorrow.  
Smith's press conference itself was called to announce that his amplifying statement had been supplied to Eisenhower and his Democratic opponent, Governor Adlai Stevenson, and to an aide to President Truman.

### Bank Messenger Captures Robber

MONTREAL, Sept. 30.—(CP)—Jimmie Edison celebrated his 35th anniversary as a bank messenger today by capturing a long-wanted bank robber.  
When the roly-poly Edison showed a gun in the robber's back the man surrendered without a struggle. He is believed the same man who on Sept. 10 took \$1,500 from the same bank—the Victoria Square branch of the Imperial Bank of Canada.  
The bandit picked a time when the bank was crowded with customers. He waited his turn in line and then showed a cheque through the grill. On the cheque was written: "This is a holdup. Give me money."  
Margaret Miles, on duty at the wicket, shouted "holdup" and then ducked. The customers were alerted.  
Edison pulled a gun from his pocket and ran across the floor. Before the bandit knew what had happened the gun was in his back and Edison was telling him, "Move and I'll blow your head off."  
The man said, "I do nothing," and meekly surrendered.

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### Dr. H. H. Hannam Guest Speaker At Potato Meeting

Favorably comparing the farms of Prince Edward Island with those elsewhere else in the world, Dr. H. H. Hannam, president of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, last night told a crowded gathering of farmers here that it was one of the largest attended meetings he had been to in recent years.

Held in the Auditorium at Prince of Wales College the meeting called to discuss the actions of the Potato Marketing Board heard a brief report of the work of the Federation in fighting for agricultural rights. Dr. Hannam said he felt signally honored by the cartoon in the Guardian yesterday depicting him being handed a "hot potato."

### Mental Patient Robs Bank, Kills Policeman

EAST PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 30.—(AP)—A five-foot, masted, mental-hospital escapee robbed a bank of \$38,500 today, killed a policeman, wounded another and held two women as hostages in their home before police subdued him with tear gas.  
The robber fled the bank before a guard, running from the basement, could intercept him. Police picked up the chase and pursued him through Providence into Pawtucket.  
The bandit abandoned his car and the money and forced his way into the home of Mrs. Robert Laprade and her mother, Mrs. Mary Sandring.  
Obeying the gunman's orders, Mrs. Sandring spoke to police from a window and asked them to start the motors of a car parked outside. Mrs. Laprade then forced to walk from the house with the robber as he attempted to reach the car.  
Police opened fire and the bandit dragged the woman back into the house with him. Then the tear-gas barrage started and Di Fraia, his eyes smarting and his hands shaking, walked

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Di Fraia was shot in the chest. He was taken to the hospital and died.

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
