Plan Operation On Siamese Twins
LONDON, (Reuters) — Tomonot- anyeand Wariboko, four-month-old Siamese twin girls from Nigeria, will go under the surgeon's knife late next week in a life-or-death operation to try to separate them.

Prof. Ian Aird, one of Britain's top surgeons, said they have a 50-50 chance of survival. The twins—children of Mrs. V. V. Davies of Kano, Nigeria, a Bantu, arrived here two weeks ago. They are joined by an oval bridge 15 inches in circumference uniting the lower part of their chests and abdomen. They face each other.

They share "one important solid abdominal organ", estimated to be about as thick as a man's wrist where it passes through the connecting bridge. Prof. Aird refused to name the organ involved. It is known, however, that he is awaiting the arrival from Edmonton, Alta., of a motion picture taken of a similar operation there in May, 1943.

The Edmonton twins, Brenda and Beverly Townsend, died three hours after the operation began. The only vital organ they shared was the liver.

Makes Offer To Talk Armistice In Indo-China

STOCKHOLM, (AP) — The Stockholm newspaper Expressen published a cable Sunday over the name of Ho Chi Minh, Moscow-educated president of the Vietnam, offering to discuss a possible armistice for ending the war in Indo-China. First French reaction was chilly.

The published message said the Vietnam would "be ready to meet" a proposal from France and that neutral efforts for a settlement would be "welcome". It said "American imperialism" was to blame for prolonging the war. In Paris, Marc Jaquet, French secretary of state for Indo-Chinese affairs, said the statement could be considered a basis for opening negotiations.

"If Ho Chi Minh wants to make the same declaration officially," he told reporters, "there is no lack of means of doing so."

Jamaican Freed By Police Sunday

KINGSTON, Jamaica, (AP) — The Jamaican who like Sir Walter Raleigh spread his coat before the Queen of England so she could cross a puddle dry shot was freed by police Sunday after doctors called him sane.

Warren Kidd was arrested at Port Royal as the Queen was about to embark for Panama. Doffing his cream-colored coat, which bore in its lapel an emblem inscribed with the words "God Save the Queen", the 35-year-old Jamaican spread it in front of the Queen and bade her walk on it.

Surprised, the Queen stopped, sidestepped the coat and went on with a smile. Kidd was hauled off to jail. He told reporters after his release, "no madman or coward could have done what I did. It took a brave man to show such courage."

New Disarmament Efforts Urged

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., (AP) — The UN General Assembly called on its 12-nation disarmament commission Saturday to intensify efforts to slash armaments and proposed secret big-power talks to speed up the program.
