

# Dowling And Kelly In Maritime Golf Final

## N.S. Girl Wins Jones Match As Provincial Rifle Meet Continues

In the third day of competition in the 79th annual Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet, Miss Elsie Strong, 17-year-old sharpshooter from Windsor, N.S., topped off top honors in the Jones Memorial Match by chalking up an amazing total of 103 out of a possible 105.

Firing at the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges, Miss Strong recorded her 103 by tie with four others with the same score, taking the match on a shoot-off. The other near possibilities were Sgt. Eric Coles, Cpl. A. M. Johnston, Sgt. G. G. MacLennan and Capt. A. J. McCabe.

On the Grand Aggregate score, Major A. F. Garmley recorded the honors with a powerful 465 total out of a possible 480 to win the Governor General's silver medal, while Captain E. R. Burke was runner-up for the bronze medal with a total of 469. Other leading Grand Aggregate scores were Cpl. C. C. Strong with 458 and O.C. T. F. Baines and Captain A. J. McCabe with tie scores of 457.

**Outstanding Shooting**  
In addition to the five who scored near possibilities of 103 in the Jones Memorial Match, five other marksmen chalked up 102's, another 101 and four with 100's, making the outstanding total of 16 riflemen scoring 100 or better out of the 105 match possible.

Sergeant P. J. Landrigan captured the Cameron-Vinnicombe Challenge Trophy in a shoot-off with Corporal A. M. Johnston. The shoot-off was at the 600 yard range.

Competing in the MacKinnon Match, Capt. A. J. McCabe, Cpl. W. M. Beatty, Cpl. A. M. Johnston and Lt. P. T. Hooper tied for first place with possible scores of 50. Owing to weather conditions, the shoot-off to decide the winner was postponed yesterday afternoon until this morning at 9:00 a.m.

Following the conclusion of the shoot-off for the MacKinnon Match, the four-day competitions will be brought to a close with **Bauld Turns Back Threat To Tennis Crown**

HALIFAX, Aug. 1 (CP)—Defending champion Don Bauld of Halifax turned back the first serious threat to his crown today when he defeated Roland Godin of Montreal, Canada's second ranking junior, in the quarter finals at the Nova Scotia tennis tournament here.

Bauld, hitting in faultless style, did not give his young opponent a chance to get started, winning in straight sets 6-0, 6-1. In the three sets Godin won 22 points and in city one game did the score go past deuce. The only game Godin took was the fourth of the third set.

In the other singles matches Robert Bedard, Sherbrooke, Que., Andre De Chavigny, Quebec, Dr. Phil Cole, Hubbards, N.S., Syd Bartlett, Jimmy Scriven, and Bill Pope, Halifax, all gained the round of eight. Dr. Cole eliminated Marc Blondeau, Quebec, in straight sets; Scriven had to go three sets to down Doug Bauld 6-0, 1-6, 6-4. In tomorrow's matches it will be Bedard against Bartlett; Scriven against Pope; De Chavigny against Cole.

In the women's singles, play was narrowed to the semi-finals. Marion Edger, Montreal, Mrs. C. H. Mitchell, Sydney, N.S., Carolyn Flemming, Truro, and Vida Large, Halifax, remained in the quest for the crown held by Mrs. Mitchell. Miss Edger had the toughest fight to gain her bracket, being forced to three sets by Mrs. T.W. Thompson, Halifax. All the others won in straight sets without difficulty.

Local boxing fans were treated to one of the sharpest bouts to be witnessed here in recent years when challenger Harry Poulton of Charlottetown made a strong but vain effort to regain his Maritime welterweight title from Tommy (Gun) Spencer of New Waterford, N.S., in a 10-round water fight on Tuesday night. Poulton, who lost his title to the Nova Scotia scrapper at New Glasgow on July 16th, battled it out in a furious struggle with the champion but the best he could do only earned him a draw decision, to leave Spencer still champion.

It is not hard to figure out why Spencer has had the "gun" affixed to his name, because the way he throws punches is about as damaging and rapid as the well-known automatic weapon it refers to. Tuesday night he used both hands liberally to both the body and head of Poulton and brought into play a damaging left hook that seemed to come out of nowhere, and twice caught the challenger flush on the jaw to send him to the canvas for eight counts.

The local boxer, however, proved that he could take it as well as dish it out. Probably the smoothest ringman to be produced in the Province in a good many years, Poulton brought all his skill and fighting spirit into play in the rugged, beautifully boxed contest. Using a rapier left hand that continually kept the champion off balance, he landed home with solid punching himself and outfaced Spencer from landing his own damaging blows on many occasions.

Although Poulton hit the canvas twice, once in the fifth and again in the eighth, both knock-downs were close to the bell and Poulton was able to come fighting back to stave off the challenger without any further damage being done. Practically every round of the fight saw both contestants hammer one another in fast, torrid furries which were interspersed with excellent displays of skillful boxing, both offensively and defensively that brought many complimentary remarks and expressions of pleasure from the spectators.

Holding probably the slight edge in boxing ability over Spencer, Poulton lacked the damaging punching power of the champion or obviously it might have been a draw. Poulton hit his man often enough to have been a contender on a Sunday punch but the bobbing and weaving Spencer didn't seem to be greatly troubled with the blows, although he had to fight furiously at times to get out of some hot sessions that might have had him in trouble. A hard, fast counter-puncher, Spencer used that to extricate himself from any dangerous moments. Poulton's fast, evasive tactics served him in good stead for the same purpose.

The willingness of both fighters, and the clamoring demand of those who witnessed the match, has already set the stage for a return bout with the title at stake in the near future. Forum manager Bill Brown announced that decision last night, and although the exact date of the meeting has not been set as yet, both boxers have agreed to the re-match, which will make their fourth meeting in a little over a month. Poulton took a decision over Spencer at Halifax in their first meeting just a few weeks ago.

Manager Brown gave out the dope on the return match less than an hour after Tuesday night's bout had been concluded. So many expressions of satisfaction over the scrap by fans, and their eagerness to see the two in action again, prompted Bill to get an agreement from the two principals before they left the Forum. To say that the forthcoming bout will be a crowd-pleaser is a waste of words. It will be a natural for a terrific scrap.

## No Agreement On Return Bout, Charles-Walcott

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (AP)—Boxing's high brass failed today to reach an agreement on the return heavyweight championship fight between Jersey Joe Walcott and Ezzard Charles.

Charles wants a quick new shot at the 37-year-old Camden, N.J., gladiator who wrested the title from him with a seventh-round knockout July 18 at Pittsburgh.

Walcott's manager, Felix Boccichio, is insisting that the new champion not defend his crown until sometime next year.

Jim Norris, head of the International Boxing Club, and Boccichio held a long conference today in Norris' Madison Square Garden offices.

Afterwards, both principals said no definite decision was reached. Tom Tannas, who with Jake Mintz is co-manager of Charles, told the I.B.C. executive that Charles is anxious to hold Walcott to his 90-day return bout agreement in their contract.

Charles also is insistent that he, and not Joe Louis, get the next crack at Walcott's title.

There has been a strong move by supporters of the Brown Bomber to ease his way into the picture ahead of Charles for the next championship fight. Louis holds two verdicts over Walcott.

## Display Good Golf Despite Rough Weather; Pros In Title Play

Over the wind-swept, rain-drenched Belvedere course of the Charlottetown Golf Club, Maurice (Moose) Dowling of the Moncton, N.B. Lakeside Club, defending champion, and Pete (Red) Kelly, Fredericton, a two-time winner, yesterday battled their way to the finals of the Maritime Amateur Golf Championship. They meet today in the 36-hole wind-up for the title.

In making it all new Brunswick final, Dowling took Ronan Duchemin of Sydney, N.S. in a morning round 4 and 3, while Kelly survived a closing spurt by Ralph Foley of Dartmouth to win 3 and 1.

In the afternoon semi-final youthful Thane Cody of the Saint John Riverside Club who had earlier scored a triumph over Nova Scotia champion Lorne Smith 2 and 1, pressed Dowling to the limit before bowing out to his nearest opponent. Lee had an 81 in the morning round and a 73 for the afternoon 18—one over par.

All morning a threatening sky and a tricky cross course wind made the going difficult, but it was during the afternoon round that things became really rugged. A torrential rain became a hazard difficult to cope with and the verdant fairways and velvet greens of the Belvedere course were heavy with water.

The Dowling-Cody duel was the feature match in the day's play. In the large gallery on hand was forced to shelter in the clubhouse. At the end of the first nine holes the 21-year-old Cody, last year's runner-up to the Maritime Junior title, led three up. Dowling, however, rallied to take the 11th, 12th and 14th holes. Cody bounced back to win the 15th with a birdie and on the 16th Dowling duplicated this feat, also registering a birdie. They halved the 17th with a par performance. On the 18th Dowling finished with a par four, but Cody ran into difficulty when a high shot over a line of trees carried passed the green. It took him a five to finish.

The finals in two flights were concluded yesterday. In the 3rd Division, Dr. Chris Gallant, Charlottetown, defeated V. Savage, Halifax, 4 and 2, while in the 3rd Division Consolation J. McCafferty of Moncton scored a two-up victory over George Wood of the home club.

The finals will be played today in both the 2nd Division and the 2nd Division Consolation. In the former Skip Sear, Charlottetown, will play T. Bainbridge, Halifax, while in the latter, J. Sears Fredericton, will match strikes with Bill MacNeill, Charlottetown.

In the first 36 holes of a 72 hole competition for the Maritime Professional the Cecil Dowling of the Green Gables Golf Club, Cavendish, led the seven man field with a total score of 153. Four strokes behind and in second place was Pete Shymko of Truro. Sam Kerr of the Ken-Wo Club, and Vin Hallsall of Moncton Lakeside were tied for third place each with 160.
