Mr. and Mrs. Russell Garrett, Red Point, were business visitors to Charlottetown recently.

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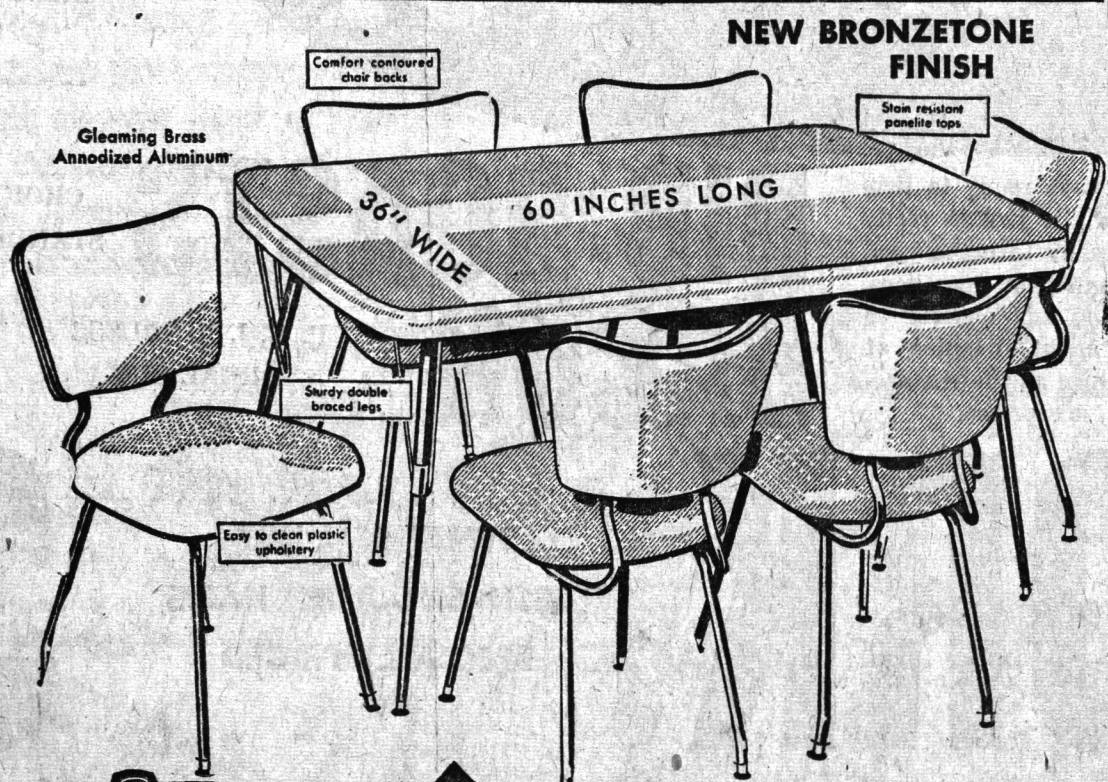
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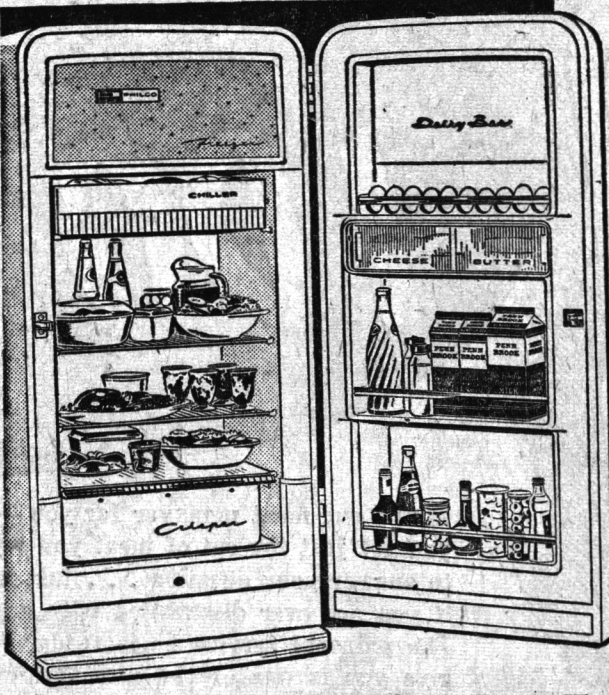

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GETS BANK REWARD

SASKATOON (CP) — Angus Campbell of Saskatoon says he has received a \$22,000 cheque from the Royal Bank of Canada. It represents the reward offered for the capture of Fred and Rodney Montgomery, who killed a bank manager in an abortive hold-up at Blind River, Ont., last Oct. 9. The 65-year-old Campbell supplied the information that led to the arrest of the Montgomery father and son on the farm near Clark at Delisle last Nov. 17.
