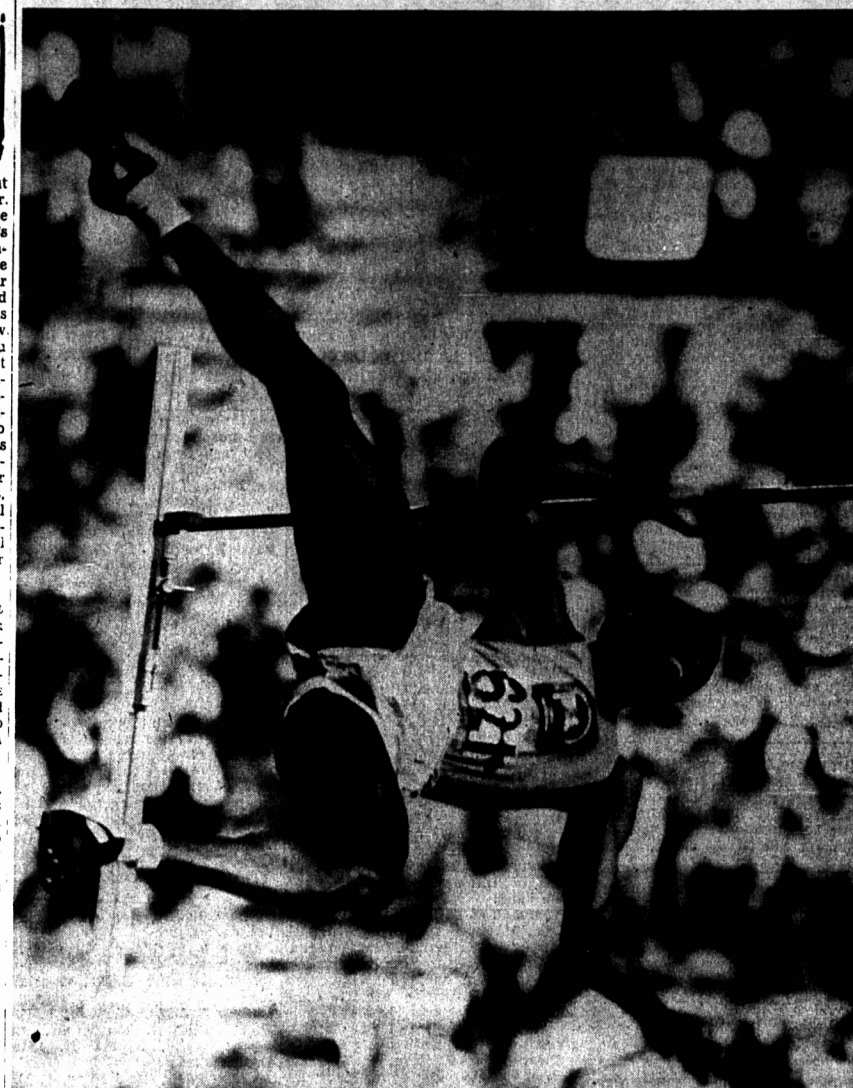
Guess there isn't much left to say. If this weather keeps up much longer we may as well give up sports and start an umbrella store.

Canada Wins Two Gold Medals At BEG Yesterday

VANCOUVER (CP)—Bill Patrick, 22-year-old Canadian diving champion from Calgary and a youthful eight-oared crew from the University of British Columbia gave Canada two gold medals Wednesday as most of the early British Empire Games action concentrated on aquatic sports.

Patrick won the tower diving at Empire Pool here while the UBC eight drove to an easy 2 1/2-length victory over England on the Venedler canal before a big crowd including the Duke of Edinburgh. Eleven water championships were

decided and the spoils went to six countries. New Zealand and Australia each picked up three titles, Canada was next with two and single gold medals went to South Africa, Scotland and England.

5 CANADA GOLD MEDALS

Canada's rowing and diving triumphs gave the country five gold medals since the nine-day Commonwealth sports spectacle opened last Friday. The others were taken earlier by weightlifters, the muscle men of the games. The pace-setting Englishmen picked up 56 points, biggest haul of the day, to boost their total at the top of the 24-country standing to 280 1/2. The runner-up Australians added 45 1/2 for a total of 185 1/2 and Canada retained third position with 166 points, adding 43. (Continued on page 13)

Newport Dream Wins Hambletonian Trotting Race

GOSHEN, N.Y. (AP)—Newport Dream, won the \$106,830 Hambletonian trotting race Wednesday in two straight heats, taking the second by a neck in a three-way photo finish.
It was the first victory for owner Octave Blake of the Newport stock farm, South Plainfield, N.J., and driver Del Cameron of Pinehurst, N.C.
The bay colt won the first heat of the rich three-year-old trot by three lengths over Princess Rodney.
Newport Dream won the second heat by a neck over the favored Stenographer, Princess Rodney third and Harlan fourth.
The time for each heat was identical—2:02 4/5—almost three seconds off the Hambletonian record.
Newport Dream paid \$4.20 for the win, \$3.30 for the place and \$2.00 for show in the second heat.
Stenographer returned \$4.00 and \$3.30 and Princess Rodney \$3.10.
Del Cameron drove the winner who paid \$13.10, \$6.30 and \$4.70 in the first heat. Other first-heat prices were \$13 and \$6.30 for Princess Rodney and \$8.40 for third-place Vicki Hanover.
Rotary Hanover, owned by Rimouski Stables of Rimouski, Que., and driven by Don Larrie of Moncton, N.B., finished out of the money as did two other horses driven at Lloydminster, Sask., and at St. John's, Nfld. Hanover was piloted by Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P.E.I.
