Fatalities Reach 54

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Traffic accidents during the Dominion Day weekend have killed 54 persons since 6 p.m. Thursday, local times.

The Canadian Highway Safety Council predicted 85 would die. A Canadian Press survey to 6 p.m. Sunday, local times, also showed there were 18 drownings, one death by fire, two in a plane crash and one in a shooting accident.

Quebec had 25 dead—17 traffic, seven drownings and one fire death. Ontario had 14 traffic fatalities and four drownings. Newfoundland three traffic deaths and one drowning and Prince Edward Island had three highway deaths.

Nova Scotia had one traffic fatality, two drownings and the two plane crash deaths. New Brunswick had two drownings and two road deaths. Alberta and British Columbia each had five traffic fatalities with B.C. also reporting two drownings. Manitoba had three road deaths and the shooting death. Saskatchewan one traffic fatality.
