## CWACS Are Vital Part Of Canada's Militia Set Up

OTTAWA (CP) — In Canada's militia, it's no longer a case of "shall we join the ladies."

For the ladies, more than 2,000 strong, already serve beside their khaki-clad male counterparts in the five army commands across Canada.

Behind these peacetime, part-time women soldiers is Major Marjorie Evis, senior staff officer of the Canadian Women's Army Corps.

COMES FROM TORONTO

A tall, dark-eyed brunette, Toronto-born Major Evis is a veteran of the Second World War. She was recalled to active army duty in 1950.

Interviewed at army headquarters here, Major Evis said she acts as adviser on matters of special concern to the CWAC. Unlike the air force and the navy, there is no regular women's army.

With the exception of Major Evis and five officers in the commands, CWACS are enlisted in the army militia, or reserve.

CWAC members train two nights a week beside the men, and spend two weeks at summer training camps where the CWAC becomes strictly feminine, with the excep-

tion of some male training officers.

With 103 officers and 2,123 other ranks now in the CWAC, the women "do practically everything." Fully integrated into the militia, they receive uniforms free and train in trades ranging from radar operators to medical assistants.

About the only things CWACS don't do is train in weapon drill or firearms; members are engaged in clerical duties. But they can take rifle practice as a form of recreation.

During the Second World War, 101 officers and 1,843 other CWAC ranks served overseas.

ENLISTED AS PRIVATE

Major Evis, working as a secretary in Toronto and as a Red Cross volunteer, enlisted in 1941 as a 24-year-old private.

One of the first Toronto women to enlist, she served in Canada, the United Kingdom and north-west Europe. She was commissioned a lieutenant in 1943 and promoted to major in 1945.

At the end of the war, she served at Frankfurt, Germany, as Canadian liaison officer at British and American headquarters.

The same evening, a reception was held in their honor in Piusville Hall. The bride and groom received many beautiful gifts, including a substantial sum of

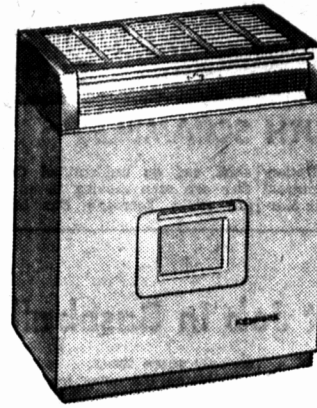
PERMANENT SEATS

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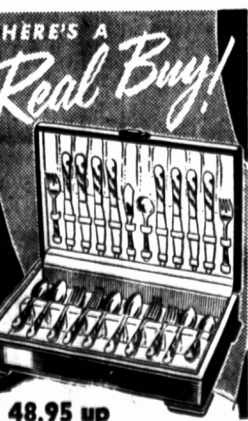
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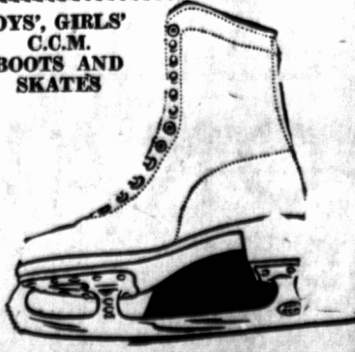
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
