CANADIANS IN ACTION TODAY

Snow Interferes With Play At World Hockey Opening

OSLO (CP) — Driving snow choked the outdoor Jordal Amphitheatre in the opening game of the world hockey championship Friday.
The snowstorm interfered with skating and passing. This could become a hazard for other games in the remaining nine days of the tournament.
Three of the stronger teams had easy wins while the big guns and Russia were idle.
Czechoslovakia overpowered Finland 5-1 in the opening game. The defending champions, Sweden, whitewashed Norway 9-0 in an early afternoon game.
The United States, ranked third with Sweden in pre-tournament guessing, finished the day's play by crushing Poland 12-4.
The power-packed Canadian Whittby side moves into action today against Poland. Russia, rated the team that will give Canada the hardest struggle in the tournament, meets Norway.
CROWD KEPT AWAY
The driving snow fell over the open-air stadium during the first game, keeping an expected capacity crowd of about 10,000 down to 1,000 — mostly hardy school children. By the third game, 5,000 fans were watching, including King Olaf V who officially opened the tournament.
The game was halted during the second period so the ice could be cleared. The fall was so heavy it interfered with skating and passing. At its height, visibility was cut to less than rink length.
The storm pointed up a possible disadvantage that the eight contending teams may face. In addition to slowing down some of the faster squads, snow on the ice could interfere with the precision passing plays worked up by some of the Europeans.
"I've never seen a game played in snow like this before," remarked Canadian Manager Wren Blair.
Sweden, the team that upset Russia last year to win the world title, ran into surprisingly stiff opposition from Norway in the first period. The Norwegians checked furiously and kept up a potent attack that several times bottled play in the Swedish end of the rink.

The Hunter Profits When A Farm Is Abandoned

Abandoned farms, many already reclaimed by Nature, dot our province from one end to the other. The Hinterland of Eastern Kings county is an example. The section known as "The Glen", once a thriving farming community, is now practically deserted. Few farms are occupied although some are still cultivated. We don't have to go to eastern Kings to find deserted farms, they may be found within a few miles of Charlotte town. Many may not agree with that such grown up farms—reclaimed by nature farms in other words—will turn out to be saviour's of our wildlife. In certain districts they have already proved their worth. They are replacing the areas ravaged by commercial pulp cutting and it's good thing that they are.
BEST HUNTING
The best hunting I have enjoyed in this past few years has been on grown-over farms. Rabbits, Ruffed grouse, pheasants and woodcock are the species that are benefited the most, but Hungarian partridge are beginning to show a marked preference for this (Continued on page 11)

Rink-Wise Curlers Will Arrive Soon For Brier

VICTORIA (CP) — Rink-wise veterans, many of whom learned the game on the Prairies, arrive here during the weekend for the Canadian curling championship.
Some of the 11 rinks in the title play have youngsters, too, making their debut in the big-time.
Play opens Monday at the Victoria Memorial Arena, where the attendance for the week is expected to exceed 30,000, making it second only to the 1955 matches in Regina when an estimated 56,000 spectators attended.
Each province has a representative rink with Ontario twice in the entry list. There is Ontario and Northern Ontario.
Manitoba, a 15-time winner in the 31-year history of the championship, will have the youngest rink ever to compete for a Canadian title.
The rink is skipped by Terry Braunstein, an 18-year-old champion from Winnipeg, who started curling in 1949.
Seeking his third title will be Matt Baldwin of Edmonton whose Alberta rink is a veteran four. Baldwin has played on Canadian championship ice three times and has won twice, in 1954 and 1957.
Shooting for his third championship, he and his crew will play the knockout game, instead of draw-game tactics.
"We tried draw-game tactics earlier this year," says Baldwin. "Now we'll stick to knockout play."
Tony Gutoski and his Victoria rink will represent British Columbia. The 42-year-old skip is the icebreaker at the Victoria Curling Club. Born in Eden, Man., he started to curl at 12.
